**COST OF SECRET SERVICE.**

Some interesting figures have been brought to light in the controversy over the abuse by the president of the secret service, and its use to spy upon political enemies in order to defame them and injure their reputations for Roosevelt's own political advantage, as shown in the vicious attacks by vague innuendo upon Senator Tillman. They show that Mr. Roosevelt has had appropriations from congress aggregating \$44,000,000 during the last two years to probe Oregon and other land frauds, railroad rebates and other violations of the laws, to prevent frauds, punish violators and enforce statutes.

In spite of the \$44,000,000 expended, not a single one of the "criminal-rich" has been sent to prison, not a single timber king gone to jail or forced to disgorge stolen public domain, and still the prosecution of settlers who honestly seek to acquire homes in the wilderness goes on by an army of paid spies, seeking to justify their retention. An empire of land is presented to a settler without question, but a poor homesteader is hounded and every effort made to take away his claim. He is forced to heavy expense to defend his rights, while congress votes untold wealth for his persecution.

The New York World thus summarizes the cost of the secret service under Mr. Roosevelt:

"The Cleveland Plain Dealer calls upon congress to 'save the secret service,' regardless of the president's defiance of official propriety. This appeal represents the attitude of many newspapers which have been misled by Mr. Roosevelt's statements and believe that congress seriously crippled the police work of the national government when it restricted the activities of the treasury department's secret service to its lawful functions.

"How many persons know that only twenty secret service men were affected by the amendment which Mr. Roosevelt made so much fuss about, while the total appropriations made by congress last year for secret service and surveillance of that character aggregate \$7,214,593.35, an increase of \$792,000 over the previous year?"

"How many persons know that congress gave Mr. Roosevelt \$500,000 to investigate land frauds alone, an increase of \$250,000?"

"How many persons know that congress gave him \$250,000 to enforce the anti-trust law, besides \$500,000 to pay such 'miscellaneous expenses' as the attorney general should authorize?"

"How many persons know that congress gave him \$1,160,000 to enforce the interstate commerce laws, an increase of \$406,765 over the previous year?"

"How many persons know that congress gave him \$3,000,000 to enforce the meat inspection laws, \$1,000,000 to enforce the postal laws and \$760,000 to enforce the pure food law?"

"How many persons know that congress gave him \$115,000 to suppress counterfeiting; \$125,000 to prevent violations of the internal revenue law; \$200,000 to prevent frauds in the customs service, and \$500,000 to enforce the Chinese exclusion act?"

"How many persons know that the aggregate amount appropriated last year to be used in whole or in part to prevent frauds on or deprivations upon the various branches of the public service, to protect public lands from fraudulent entries and to punish other violations of the law is \$23,588,170, an increase of \$2,831,660?"

"How many persons know that during the last two years alone Mr. Roosevelt has had nearly \$14,000,000 to prevent and punish violations of the law?"

"Mr. Roosevelt in his special message of January 4 especially emphasized the important work done by the treasury secret service men in the detection of land frauds. Secretary Garfield told the house sub-committee last year that the interior department no longer employed treasury secret service men to investigate land frauds, as their lack of knowledge rendered their investigations and reports practically worthless. Secretary Cortelyou's report showed that there had been no secret service details from the treasury department for two years, and that there had been only thirty-two details to all the other departments in that time.

"The only issue between congress and the president was whether each department should employ its own investigators and detectives or whether the treasury secret service should be transformed into an irresponsible spy system. Yet Mr. Roosevelt, who has had appropriations aggregating nearly \$44,000,000 during the last two years to enable him to enforce the law and has not yet sent a single 'malefactor of great wealth' to jail, sought to convince the country that a congress of crooks had deliberately paralyzed the machinery of justice because 'the congressmen did not themselves wish to be investigated by secret service men.'"

**FISHERMEN DO NOT AGREE ENTIRELY WITH McALLISTER**

The Oregon Fish and Game association does not approve of some of the recommendations to be made to the state legislature by Fish Commissioner Harry C. McAllister, and are about to submit to him an amendment to

the principal clause in McAllister's recommendation is that which asks the legislature to prohibit all fishing in the vicinity of river falls or fish runs. According to the association, this clause is merely a benefit to the net and trap fishermen, who can use any portion of a stream without trouble,

while the fishermen who confine their selves to the use of the hook and line are always in a position to use a boat in order to catch salmon. Furthermore they contend that what few fish they catch with the hook and line is being sold at a profit to the wholesale slaughter furnished by the net and trap fishermen, and believe that they should be allowed the privilege of fishing in the forbidden points with their regular outfits, which would result in a few more fish.

**LOOK FOR GIRL TO SIT ON BEAU'S KNEE**

CLEVELAND, Jan. 21.—In a local case in which no names were used, Judge Adams of the juvenile court ruled today that a girl may sit on her beau's knee without fear of interference by the law.

An excited crowd gathered in front of the courthouse "this afternoon" to see the trial of a young man charged with the murder of a young woman. Her name is not given, but she was a well-to-do girl. The young man, who is charged with the murder, is a young man of about 25 years of age, and was well liked by neighbors and friends. The case is expected to be a sensational one.
