JACK FROST SLIGHTLY NIPS HEPPNER ORCHARDS HEPPNER, Ore., Jan. 22.—It is thought there has been no damage to grain during the cold period, but fruit and forest trees have been slightly injured by the top having been frozen. Portland Strivers. PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 22.—Such weather as is now being experienced in the Willamette valley has not visited Portland for 20 years. Although the average citizen is not materially affected by the rains at this time, business men along Front street have been put practically out of business by the flood, and every dock on the river front is blocked so that the merchandise generally transferred to vessels from the lower docks has been forced to the upper piers at a great inconvenience and in some cases material loss. All through that section of the country the drift is going and in the upper Columbia the ice has jammed so that river traffic is not only at a standstill, but many of the docks and fish wharves will be damaged when the backwaters loosen and start down the river, a condition which threatens at any time.

TALENT MAN VICTIMIZED

Bought Mules in Good Faith Only to Learn That They Had Been Stolen

G. K. Howitt, a well known wood and coal contractor at Portland, came out to Ashland Saturday to look up a pair of valuable mules missing from a carload which he had shipped from Sacramento to Portland the first of the week, says the Tidings. He found them in possession of a well known citizen of Talent, who had purchased them in good faith for \$275 from Jack Kirke, who was in charge of the shipment for Howitt, it seems, but who represented himself as being the owner. Howitt had purchased ten fine large mules near Sacramento and secured Kirke, who was recommended to him at the initial point of shipment, to accompany the car to Portland and care for and feed the animals.

At Ashland, which is a regular feeding point for stock in transit over the Southern Pacific, Kirke carried on the 12th and 13th inst., feeding and resting the animals, representing himself as their owner. After negotiating the sale in question and pocketing the proceeds, he hired J. L. Clout to accompany the car from here to Portland and stated that he himself would take a faster train. And this is the last seen of Kirke.

WANT MODEL LIQUOR LAWS

The National Association Gathers in Louisville to Discuss Prohi Wave

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Jan. 22.—To secure the adoption of model liquor laws, as a check to the wave of prohibition and local option that is now sweeping over the country is the object of the National Model License league which commenced a three days' session in Louisville today.

Leaders in the movement inaugurated by the league may radical improvement in the methods of dispensing alcoholic beverages must be made if the liquor business is to remain a legalized institution in many states and express a desire to hear the views of those who have plans to bring about improvements.

The league is a national organization of 800 distillers, brewers, winemakers, wholesalers, retailers and collateral tradesmen and is conducting a national campaign in behalf of a model license law.

The objects and purposes of the Model License league are to take the liquor question out of politics and to take the legislature out of the liquor business. If there is to be any radical reformation, it is declared, it must be along these lines.

Formulated by Gilmore. The model license law was formulated by T. M. Gilmore of Louisville, president of the National Model License league. For years Mr. Gilmore studied the liquor business by personal observation in this country and in Europe, and he selected the best clauses of the best laws of the best governed districts in the world.

The model license law provides that all liquor licenses in effect at the time of the passage of the law shall remain in effect until suspended or canceled because of violation of the law.

The law provides also that upon conviction for a first offense the license holder must forfeit the right to do business for a period of 90 days, and upon a second conviction he must forfeit forever his right to hold a liquor license in the state in which the license has been forfeited.

Holders of licenses would be protected from undue competition by that clause of model license law which provides that after the passage of model license law no new licenses can be issued until the population is in the proportion of (say) 500 to each license. This would not only give the license holder assurance of a reasonable amount of trade and therefore a reasonable profit on his investment, but would protect society from the evils that it is claimed result from a multiplicity of drinking places.

Not High License. The National Model License league does not advocate excessive high license for the alleged reason that such license causes the dealer to handle inferior wares in order to make a profit. The license fee, it is asserted, should be sufficient to give a good revenue to the local and state government without being oppressive.

According to the league's figures, the people of this country drink two billion gallons of fermented and distilled alcoholic beverages in 1907. The amount consumed in 1908, notwithstanding the slump that the liquor industry suffered with almost every other line of business in account of the financial stringency, was about as much as in the year previous.

This consumption is equivalent to 27 1/2 gallons for every man, woman and child in the country, and shows off each say it would be foolish, in view of this enormous demand, to believe that this nation is prepared to give up the use of alcoholic beverages or that the day of totalitarians will arrive in a matter of next day, or in the next few decades.
