JEFFRIES RECEIVES OFFER OF \$100,000 FOR 33 WEEKS

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Jan. 23.—James J. Jeffries, the retired heavyweight champion, who is filling a theatrical engagement here, has received an offer of \$100,000 for 33 weeks of sparring exhibitions on an eastern vaudeville circuit. The offer was made by Sam Wheeler, the fight promoter of St. Louis. Jeffries still refuses to admit that he has any intentions of attempting to wrest the championship from Jack Johnson, but the belief is growing stronger each day that the retired champion will again be seen in the ring. Although a trifle fat, Jeffries shows all the speed that made him the wonder of the heavyweight division during his active fighting days, and his sparring partner, Sam Berger, is authority for the statement that the big fighter's blows have not lost their steam.

AWFUL RAT SCARES PRETTY GIRL; LAMP DROPS; FIRE

SAN LUIS OBISPO, Cal., Jan. 23.—A rat running across the parlor floor scared 16-year-old Marie Reiss as she was carrying an oil lamp in her hands early on the morning. She dropped the lamp, which exploded and set the house on fire. Mrs. Reiss, the daughter and three sons were under quarantine for diphtheria, but were compelled to flee from the flames and shelter in a shed in the garden until daylight.

WRITES CHECK FOR FUNERAL EXPENSES AND KILLS SELF

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 23.—John Bisho, a Richmond Beach resident, wrote out a check for a sum sufficient, as he explained, in a note, to cover all necessary funeral expenses, and then shot himself. The suicide, in the absence of his family, said to be wintering in southern California, was alone in their suburban home. Of late he had lost heavily gambling at Everett and Edmonds. Henry Parry, a neighbor, called the man's home the next morning and found Bisho dead, shot through the head.

ORDERS RECEIVED FOR 1,000,000 CARTRIDGES FOR ARMY

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 23.—Orders have been received at the Frankfort arsenal in this city for the manufacture of 1,000,000 rifle cartridges. This order, with those on hand, will keep the arsenal busy day and night until the end of the fiscal year in June. The arsenal has been working day and night since September 3.

MILLION DOLLARS IN REVENUE FROM TIMBER

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—The state's purse was fattened by nearly \$1,000,000 in revenue last year from timber cut off the various national forests, the timber yield being 102 per cent of an increase over the preceding year. Twenty-five per cent of this amount went back into the state treasury, in which the forests are located, in lieu of taxes, in accordance with the law. The amount of timber cut from all the national forests was 392,792,000 feet, against 194,872,000 feet in 1907.

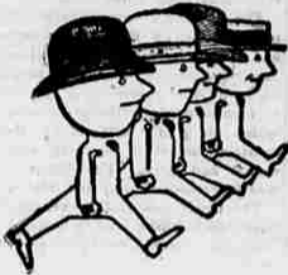
WALNUT STOCK MAKES FINEST OF FURNITURE TIMBER

E. C. Payne, the carpenter and cabinet maker, has demonstrated that black walnut trees grown in this section make the finest of furniture timber, says the Tidings. A number of years ago he put away to season sections of a big black walnut tree which had reached a diameter of about 15 inches in an Ashland house yard when it became a mark for the ax. Recently as an experiment he took a piece of the well seasoned stock and made it up into a few odd pieces of furniture, with the result that the wood took a finish and a polish as beautiful as could be asked for, rivaling the finest polished black

walnut of furniture commerce. The black walnut is very common here as a shade tree and seems to be well adapted for a vigorous growth in this climate.
