WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—Amateur and professional astronomers of Washington and throughout the country will spend the next few evenings making observations of the rapidly speeding little planet Mercury. For some time this small world has been moving out from behind the sun, and today it reaches its greatest distance east, affording the best opportunity for observation. This evening many telescopes will be trained toward the southwestern sky where Mercury may be seen in all its glory shortly after sunset. The planet will be seen a short distance northward from the point on the horizon at which the sun was seen to set.

WORK ON NEW BRIDGE CARRIED AWAY SATURDAY

GRANTS PASS, Or., Jan. 26.—The river has been on a rampage for more than two weeks and last Friday night it reached its highest point and about 3 o'clock Saturday morning the only two piers set in the new bridge at the foot of Sixth street were toppled over and carried down the river several hundred yards below. These piers had been set in the middle of the river and driven from 1 to 145 feet in the bottom. Heavy timbers had been placed on them and it was supposed by the bridge builders that the high water would not disturb them, but the Rogue river has a powerful current and at times it sweeps everything before it. The old timer informed the bridge contractors that they might expect high water and there was only one way to escape its consequences, and that was to finish the bridge by the first of January, the date mentioned in the contract. It is said that loss in consequence of this mishap will be \$4000.

SENATOR BANKHEAD HOPES FOR ONLY SHORT SESSION

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—Senator Bankhead of Alabama today expressed the belief that the extra session of congress to be called by Mr. Taft would not last longer than August 1. "That seems to be the general idea among representatives with whom I have talked," he said. "None of us desire to remain here during the hot days of August."

TEN THOUSAND ROAD MAPS OF OREGON TO BE GIVEN AWAY
