HARKELL DECLARES HEARST IS AT BOTTOM OF DEAL. MURKOFFE, GENE, Jan. 28.—With the sitting of the federal grand jury to investigate the alleged town lot fraud, Muskogee becomes the cynosure of the eyes of half a nation. That the government regards the matter of great import is evidenced by the fact that the jury is closely watched and guarded by secret service men—rumor has it that there is a man for every juror. Additional interest is added in the case by reason of the implication of the governor, Charles N. Haskell, in the investigation. He, in turn, declares the entire matter is due to the enmity of William H. Hearst. This simplification of the case is an echo of the presidential campaign of last year.

IDAHO MAY NO LONGER BE A DIVORCE MECCA

BODIE, Idaho, Jan. 28.—Idaho ceases to be a divorce Mecca if a bill introduced in the legislature passes. It extends the period of residence required from six to 18 months. Since the revision of the South Dakota divorce laws Idaho has been the easiest state in which to obtain a divorce.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—A vigorous campaign by the representatives of Oregon, Washington and California for a large appropriation for better naval stations on the Pacific coast was decided on today by the congressmen and senators from the coast.

FAITHFUL EMPLOYE IS REWARDED 21 YEARS LATER

DENVER, Jan. 28.—Otto Heres, proprietor of a laundry in this city, has been substantially remembered in the will of the late Amos H. Vanhorn, multimillionaire furniture and carpet manufacturer of Newark, N. J. The bequest was in recognition of Heres' loyal and faithful service as an employe 21 years ago, when times were going hard with Vanhorn. "Of course I knew just my old friend and employer, Vanhorn, had died in Newark December 31, but I knew nothing of his will. I worked for him 21 years ago, when he was a struggling manufacturer. He was always my friend and I kept in correspondence with him all these years. I had no idea that he would remember me in his will and have no the slightest idea what he has left to me or any of his old employes." Vanhorn left the bulk of his fortune to hospitals, charity organizations and \$150,000 to the city of Newark for the erection of monuments.

CHICAGO, Ill., Jan. 28.—Mrs. Forest R. Harrison wife of a traveling sales man, fell in love with Frank Miller, a vaudeville singer. Yesterday Harrison compelled Miller and his wife to sign confessions. Then Harrison abandoned his wife. Today Mrs. Harrison shot herself in the side. To her father, who was called to the hospital, she said: "I did it because my husband left me." Harrison knew nothing of it until late in the evening Miller also was ignorant of the tragic sequel to the afternoon's exposure. Told of Mrs. Harrison's condition, he said: "Harrison will kill me, sure, if she dies. He may be here tonight."

WOMAN CHARGES THAT MANY DIED IN COLLISION

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 28.—Mrs. C. A. Sevrance, the wife of the attorney for the interstate commerce commission, and well known on the coast, declares the exact number of killed in the collision of the Republic and Florida off Nantucket, Mass., are untold. She said two men died in her arms. She said: "I am sure a great many more died than the officials admit. I saw not a few dead under the blankets."
