Why We Need More Payrolls in Our City. Because we have not enough money in circulation, and that alone has a tendency to cause still business. Why? Because the merchants' goods lay on the shelf too long. He must turn each dollar into one dollar and ten cents each year or he does not make a living profit. The number must receive a certain amount of deposits and make a certain amount of loans as his bank must seem to be of commercial value, and an unbroken and endless line of business. Now how can these business conditions be improved, is the question. Payroll! More payrolls! Larger payrolls! In this situation, five men steady employment at fair wages and the world moves with little hindrance. Our jobs full and boiling, our merchants busy, our bank vaults full of real money. And, my dear people, there is just one way to this payroll. Can we ignore these facts? Can we afford to turn away even the least of these great staples called the payroll? Let us men of business and men of moderate means concentrate our minds on these facts and think for ourselves only. Why do some of us depend at all times on someone else to think for us? Do you realize that you cannot always trust to the other man's judgment, for it is human nature for self to come first. Think, people, stop and think, before you give up a prospective payroll. Twelve other sailors have been condemned to three years' imprisonment as a disciplinary punishment of concert at Kronos on a similar charge of a lesser degree of actual guilt. These sentences being the number of men of the Fleet crew tried and sentenced as soldiers during the year just closed to 913.
