W. Dennis & Sons of Covent Garden report the London apple market under date of January 23 as follows: "We regret that we are unable to give you any more favorable report upon advices contained. For some time past our market has been very heavily supplied with Rogue River fruit, which buyers have been able to purchase at from 7 to 9.5 per box quite freely, and, in point of quality, it is the best on the market. Any substantial improvement in trade, which we are hoping for, is very slow in showing itself, and whilst we should be only too glad to give shippers encouragement, we feel that it is better for them to know the exact state of affairs as we find them than to be too optimistic. Prices this week for Rogue River fruit ranged from 7 to 8.0 per box."
