STATE BOARD CALLS SESSION OF ASSESSORS

SALEM, O., Feb. 8.—The state board of equalization and the various county assessors of the state will meet in the state house Tuesday afternoon to ascertain at just what ratio the county assessors have assessed the valuation of properties.

The state law is explicit on the point of assessing to full valuation and it is said in some counties this rule has been neglected. A few counties have been assessed 100 per cent, but in some instances this is claimed to be not true. It is said there is a possibility of ousting from office men who have been rankly disobedient to the law, and while nothing has been given out as to the purpose of the meeting, it is understood from good outside authority that assessment work will be examined carefully and some of the county officials may be called to an accounting.

SPORTSMEN VISIT SALEM TO URGE GAME LAW REFORM

SALEM, O., Feb. 8.—A large delegation of Portland sportsmen recently appeared before a committee of the state and house game commission when the bill introduced by Sen. Frank Fish and Game commission is being qualifying the game laws of the state was considered. There was some criticism of the restrictions imposed on duck and pheasant hunting, but it is understood that a majority of the committee favors the bill as presented, with the exception of a few slight changes as to the season for hunting some of the game birds protected thereunder.

Some of the sportsmen opposed that provision of the bill which closes for two years absolutely the season for hunting Chinese pheasants and provides that thereafter only male birds shall be killed and only from October 1 to December 1. Representative Brandon, a Lincoln county farmer, however, wanted the information that this provision was not to be extended until October 1, which extends until March 1 the season for hunting ducks. This is the only change in the present law and merely extends the season one month longer.

LEAVES BIG ESTATE FOR BENEFIT OF CHURCH

SANTA ROSA, Cal., Feb. 8.—A "testamentary paper" found in the desk of the late Madam Preston, head of the First Pilgrims' Covenant church and founder of the Preston colony, was filed for probate in the superior court today. It decrees that her \$125,000 estate at Preston shall go to the church.

She names Mr. and Mrs. Parley Green and Mrs. P. Bridge as trustees. She decrees that if any of the numerous heirs of her family, the Lathrops, or of her dead husband's family, claim anything from her property they shall get a dollar each. She prescribes the form of worship she wishes followed in the church at Preston and urges that only devout members of the church be permitted to speak at the services. She advises against "hiring preachers, as that is a bad thing."

ORDINANCE NO.

An ordinance providing for the securing of rights of way for the gravity pipeline of the city of Medford, and authorizing the execution of the necessary agreements therefor.

Whereas, in securing the necessary rights of way for the gravity water pipeline of the city of Medford it is necessary in some instances to furnish an agreement for compensation for damages to crops and other similar damages, now therefore,

The city of Medford, doth ordain as follows:

That the special gravity water committee heretofore appointed by the mayor and they are hereby empowered and directed to secure the necessary rights of way for the gravity water pipeline of the city of Medford, upon the most advantageous terms possible, and the mayor and recorder are hereby authorized and instructed to execute, on behalf of the city of Medford, such agreements as may be necessary to carry this ordinance into effect.

The foregoing ordinance was passed by the city council February 2, 1909; Robert voting aye, Merrick absent, Workman aye, Emerick aye, Welch aye, Bennett aye.
