### OREGON'S BUILDING READY TO OPEN UP ITS EXHIBIT

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 9.—Oregon was the first of all the states to "open up" its exhibit at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition.

It is the habit of the exposition directors when they are showing notables through the grounds, to point out the Oregon building as the first of the state buildings to be completed, and one of the handsomest of any kind on the grounds.

A few days ago they were entertaining the newspaper men of the state of Washington, and as usual led them up to the Oregon building to bring a bit. They were invited inside and, to the surprise of everyone, found big red apples by the ton, great jars of fruit and grapes and other things that Oregon produces, already to go to the tables and shelves, which were being ranged around the building.

Before they got out of the building they were taken down into the basement, where a cold storage plant is in operation, and there every one of the 200 writers present was given an apple the size of a melon and invited to come again.

### HOLDING CONVENTION TO PUT FLORIDA IN DRAY RANKS

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Feb. 9.—Plans for placing Florida in the ranks of the "dry" states of Dixie, which now include Georgia, North Carolina, Alabama, Mississippi and Tennessee, will be made by the delegates who are arriving in Jacksonville today to take part in the State anti-Saloon league's convention. The opening session will be held this evening, and three sessions are slated for tomorrow. Dr. P. A. Baker of Ohio, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of America, and the Hon. Senborn Wright, the Georgia legislator who was largely responsible for making Georgia a "dry" state, are among the speakers on the program.

As a result of the convention, it is likely that a fight for state-wide prohibition will be made in the Florida legislature. Such a measure will not be passed without a struggle, however, as the liquor dealers of Florida are wealthy and influential, and carry on an extensive shipping business to Georgia, as well as having a big local trade.

### IRISH HOLDING NATIONAL CONVENTION IN DUBLIN

DUBLIN, Feb. 9.—Following the recent preliminary conference, a general national convention of the Irish people was convened today at the Mansion house and will continue through tomorrow. The representation is practically the same as in past years, including delegates from all branches of the United Irish League, the Farmers, the Ancient Order of Hibernians and agricultural associations and county and municipal bodies. The future policy on the Irish land bill and other important questions will be decided. Great difference of opinion exists as to the merits of the government measures and a hot debate is expected.

### SEATTLE TO HAVE TEN MILES OF SUBWAY

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 9.—Seattle, by unanimous recommendation of the corporation committee today, on Monday will grant to Lloyd Ellinger & Co., London bankers, through W. L. Dudley, of Seattle and W. S. Boody of Philadelphia a 65-year franchise for ten miles of subway, passenger and freight, to cost \$8,000,000. The city is to be paid 2 per cent, and thereafter 3 per cent. In 1934, the expiration of all Seattle franchises, the city may purchase the subway at an appraised valuation, or if it elects may wait until the expiration of the 65 years, when the entire subway plant shall revert to the city.

Chicago will erect a building at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition at Seattle in 1909. The building will contain a big hall in which there will be daily lectures illustrated by moving pictures showing how Chicago goods are made. The merchants of the big western city have raised \$60,000 to assure participation at Seattle.

Yakima county, in the state of Washington, will make a fine exhibit of apples at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition in Seattle in 1909. The apples are the same variety that James J. Hill sends to the king and queen of England every year.

### FOUND THAT THEY COULD NOT BEAR TO LIVE APART

Quite an unusual thing took place at the county seat Saturday, when George Bailey applied for a license to marry Margaret Dingman. The court had just granted the lady a divorce on January 30, from Mr. Bealey, but they have seemingly made up their trouble.

### LIVE GAME DEPARTMENT AT THE SEATTLE FAIR

Five acres of virgin forest have been set aside for this purpose where the patrons of the exposition will have the opportunity of seeing the rarest collection of game animals ever exhibited in the United States.

Every animal will be catalogued with the owner's name and address, giving those who wish to dispose of their animals an opportunity to place them with an exhibit that will be seen by thousands of visitors from all parts of the world, who will daily throng the exposition grounds.

Arthur Dexter, the assistant director of this department, states that a large number of animals from Alaska, including two cub bears from Kadiak island, were brought down on the late boats last fall and are waiting to be installed with this exhibit.
