 BY BRUCE AND ELIOT
 CHICAGO, Feb. 16.—C. W. Eliot, retiring president of Harvard, last night at the annual dinner of the Harvard club of Chicago listened to a remarkable tribute to his personal worth. It was uttered by Ambassador Bryce, who said:
 "I have heard of a controversy in this country as to who was the most eminent man in the United States, and concerning this there has been a difference of opinion, but I have never heard any controversy relating to the second greatest man in the United States, and he is Charles Eliot, president of Harvard university. He has been great because of his wisdom, his courage, his sense of justice and his friendliness. I have known him for 39 years, and he is the best friend I ever knew."
 Profoundly moved, President Eliot said in reply:
 "If I never do anything more in the world, I beg you to remember that I am supremely content with what I have done and that you and others of Harvard and elsewhere, have, by your appreciation, given me this content."

NEW YORKER VANISHES.
 FOUL PLAY SUSPECTED
 MEMPHIS, Tenn., Feb. 16.—T. G. Vandergriif, 32, real estate dealer, of New York, has been missing four days and his young wife is at the central police station anxiously waiting for detectives to bring her some word of him. Foul play is feared, as he had \$200 in cash and checks and over \$500 worth of diamonds and jewelry. An old man and two younger men have left Memphis after taking Vandergriif into the country as a "companion."
 "We were en route to San Francisco, and a very agreeable young man struck up a conversation with us on the train coming to Memphis Friday night," the young wife explained. "He introduced us to his father, an aged and well appearing man. When Memphis was reached we all went to the Peabody hotel and registered. This was between 10 and 11 o'clock.
 "Telling us that he had to go into the country about two miles, the father got my husband to go with him as a companion. I made him promise not to drink and to come right back. The old gentleman seemed very nice and I saw nothing. That is the last I saw of Mr. Vandergriif."
