LIFEBOAT AND AUTO ARE COMBINED IN ONE CRAFT

ATLANTIC CITY, Feb. 18.—Rear Ad- miral J. A. Howell, U. S. N., retired naval officer, is the inventor of a new combination lifeboat and automobile which created excitement on its ap- pearance here this afternoon. The new vessel vehicle is dubbed the Amphibian, and is expected to be a valuable ac- quisition to army scouts in crossing land and water.
The contrivance is shaped as a boat, 20 feet in length, mounted on wheels and enough power is secured from a ten-horse power gasoline engine to give a land speed of 20 miles an hour. When the craft runs into water the wheels are thrown out of gear and a screw drives the affair ahead through the water at good speed. Patents have been taken out on the invention, which is partly the work of the son of Admiral Howell, and the contrivance will be of- fered first to the United States gov- ernment.

WOMAN SET TO SPY ON A MURDERER
SAN DIEGO, Cal., Feb. 18.—Interest is renewed in the case of Mrs. Effie Duden, under arrest here on the charge of having murdered her brother-in-law, Bruce Sheffield, since it has been learned that Mrs. Winifred Bronson, who has been held on a charge of aiding an art gallery, was in reality spying upon the alleged murderer.
Mrs. Bronson was confined in the same cell with Mrs. Duden and is said to have gained her confidence. Mrs. Duden has absolutely refused to make any statement since her arrest and the public here is curious to learn whether the woman spy discovered anything dur- ing her stay in the jail. She will be a witness at Mrs. Duden's trial, and her testimony is eagerly awaited, as it is believed she will be able to recollect the motives for the killing of Sheffield, which, so far as can be learned, is known only to the prisoner and possibly the spy.

STEEL TRUST TO BUILD NEW STEEL CITY
SUPERIOR, Wis., Feb. 18.—A new city like Gary, Ind., is to be built by the United States Steel corporation around a \$14,000,000 plant to be erected this spring at a point on the St. Louis river within three miles of Superior. The blast furnaces are to be situated on the Minnesota side of the river, but auxiliary plants are to be built on the Wisconsin side.
The steel corporation has bought and cleared 1600 acres of land on the Wis- consin side. The sum of \$14,000,000 has been set aside, plans have been drawn and the same construction crew that put in the steel plant at Gary has been ordered to Superior to begin work when spring opens.

RAILWAY FORCES CLASH ON ARIZONA HILLSIDE
EL PASO, Tex., Feb. 18.—The con- struction forces of the Southern Pacific railroad and Phelps, Dodge & Co. clashed at Orono, Ariz., yesterday after- noon on the lines being built into Court land, Ariz. Both companies are rush- ing construction of their lines into the new gold camp, and both claimed the same right of way on a hillside. The forces of the opposing companies spent all afternoon destroying the work done by their rivals. Finally officials of the companies arrived and a truce was called.

TRAIN HITS HANDCAR; ONE DEAD, FIVE HURT
MARSHALSTOWN, Ia., Feb. 18.—C. M. Holden of Ringstead Ia., was killed and five other men were seriously injured last night when a handcar on the Northwestern railroad, on which they were riding, was struck by a locomotive. The men were en route to Fen- ton to attend a dance.

PLAN BISON RANGE ON MONTANA RESERVATION
WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—Under the terms of the amendment proposed to the general appropriation bill, the pre- sident is directed to reserve not less than 20,000 acres of unallotted lands within the Flathead Indian reservation, Montana, at the junction of the Pend- oville and Jocko rivers, a national bison range.

WANTS INFORMATION ABOUT INCOME TAX LAW
WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—Informa- tion regarding the income tax law of foreign countries is sought by Repre- sentative Hall of Tennessee, who has submitted to the house a concurrent resolution directing the secretary of state to inform American representatives abroad. The resolution also calls for information as to whether an income tax census can be taken up or to dis- appear or the wealthy class to emi- grate without incurring such a tax. The countries from which the information sought is England, Germany, Italy, Hol- land, Switzerland, Sweden, Denmark, Spain, Prussia, Saxony and the North- lands.
