MILLIONAIRE DISGUISED AS PAUPER GIVEN FREE BED

CHICAGO, Feb. 23.—A Denver millionaire who came to Chicago and masqueraded as a pauper said today that Chicago's municipal lodging house was the city's greatest institution. He is Edwin A. Brown, business man of Denver, and cousin of W. C. Brown, president of the New York Central railroad.

Mr. Brown had passed a night in the lodging house to get ideas for a similar institution in Denver. Millionaire though he is, he donned ragged clothes when he applied for a room.

"When I got to the lodging house the old man in charge told me that the house was full, but that I was welcome to lie on the floor," said Mr. Brown.

"This I did. There were about 50 men lying on the floor. Six others were on cots. I learned that I was in the 'recreation' room. But I made up my mind to stick it out until daylight.

"I didn't sleep a wink and so I had lots of time to study the men about me. They seemed to be good, honest fellows, who were up against a run of hard luck."

After his experience Mr. Brown went back to the Auditorium Annex, where he was stopping. He said no one discovered that he was disguised.

CASTRO IS NO LONGER VENEZUELA'S PRESIDENT

CARACAS, Feb. 23.—Cipriano Castro has lost his high federal title as president of Venezuela, the high federal court having rendered a decision that sufficient evidence had been presented in the suit brought against him on the charge of attempting to bring about the assassination of Juan Vicente Gomez, the acting president. In its decision the high federal court transfers the suit to the criminal court and declares that Castro is constitutionally suspended from the presidency.

DESTROYERS LIGHT AS CANOE TO DEFEND COASTS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—Numerous states were represented at a meeting of the Naval Militia association of the United States held here today. President Roosevelt received the delegates.

In his address Assistant Secretary Satterlee, president of the association, described a new type of gasoline propelled torpedo boat destroyer which can be launched out of the water and kept as easily as a canoe, a dozen of which can be constructed for the price of one of the present type. The little vessels would have a speed of 25 knots an hour and could be placed in the hands of the naval militia for coast and harbor defense. He said the approximate cost of such vessels would be about \$50,000 each.

BOY FALLS ON THIRD RAIL AND IS TERRIBLY BURNED

SAN ANSELMO, Feb. 23.—With his arms terribly scalded and his coat burned nearly off his back, Charles Hansen, a 15-year-old boy, was pulled from the deadly third rail of the Northwestern Pacific railroad yesterday, all but dead from his experience.

Young Hansen in play grabbed a hat from the head of George Ryan, his companion, and started to run. Ryan chased him and Hansen ran up the track. He stumbled, falling toward the rail.

Just before he struck the charged steel Hansen threw his arms out in front of his face and the 500 volts shot through his arms. The young fellow was unconscious when picked from the rail by his companions. He was carried to a barn near by and medical attention called. The youth is doing well and will recover from the effect of his experience.

Bachman is now in the peculiar position of having been declared sane after escaping from an asylum, where he was committed on the verdict of a King county lunacy commission that he was insane.
