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## ROLL OF HONOR.

Every member of the Oregon legislature that worked and voted for the Crater Lake road bill proved himself a friend of southern Oregon. Every one who voluntarily gave time and assistance to the passage of the bill deserves a place on the roll of honor. When any of these gentlemen visit this section, they are entitled to be treated as guests of the community and a visit will prove to each that his efforts are remembered, and that Jackson county's hospitality is equal to its hustling ability.

Foremost on the list of those who materially helped pass the bill are those who spoke for the measure before the committees, those who helped in the lobby, and members of the press that placed the bill before the people in such a light that it secured the support of public sentiment. It is now generally conceded that no measure passed by the legislature will result in greater benefit to the entire state, for Crater Lake means to Oregon what the Yosemite means to California and will open this state to the tourist travel that now yields a golden revenue annually to California.

But one paper in the state, so far as known, opposed the measure, and that was because it was not understood. The Grange, which first opposed the project, withdrew its objections when a full understanding of the means was had, and helped on the final passage. Capital correspondents of Portland dailies, the Portland Journal, the Salem Journal, the Salem Statesman and the Portland Spectator, all did good work for the bill, and dozens of other newspapers lent their support.

The fight in the house was led by Speaker McArthur, J. A. Buchanan of Roseburg and Allen H. Eaton of Eugene, who with Messrs. Purdin and Miller, secured its triumph by a vote of 42 to 17. In the senate, L. L. Mult of Ashland, H. D. Norton of Grants Pass and G. H. Merryman of Klamath Falls were the leaders, and their efforts, which resulted in a vote of 23 to 7, were well seconded by President Jay Boverman, C. W. Nottingham and S. C. Beach of Portland. In the third house in some respects the most important of the three, everyone was for the bill.

Governor Chamberlain, who was one of those who formulated the project, aided its passage very materially. He helped draw the bill, committed himself publicly to the project in a speech at Salem, and in many ways showed his friendliness during the long fight for its passage. He has now approved its passage, and the measure is a law. All other state officials proved good friends of the bill.

That all southern Oregon was interested in the measure was shown by the constant presence of delegations of citizens from many cities, Ashland, Grants Pass, Roseburg, Central Point, Klamath Falls, Jacksonville and Medford being represented. As for the campaign—the result proves it a success.

## STRIKES WOMAN WITH BEER BOTTLE

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 25.—Senseless and with her face beaten to a shapeless mass, the body of a half-breed Indian woman was found at the foot of a flight of stairs in the new Central hotel by a roomer, who immediately notified the police.

Officers soon thereafter arrested Robert Courtwright, son of one of the wealthiest men of Snohomish county, who was found in a barber shop washing blood from his hands. He admitted striking the woman, saying he had used a beer bottle as a weapon, but claims she first attacked him with a knife.

At the hospital it is feared the woman, who gave her name as Isabel McLeod, may have sustained injuries to the skull that may result fatally.

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
