Wonders of Death Valley

An interesting entertainment will be given this afternoon and evening at the Medford Theater, where a "Trip to Death Valley" will be shown in moving pictures for the first time in this city. These pictures have been shown to thousands throughout the country, and have been giving excellent satisfaction wherever produced. The pictures are taken at great expense from the front of a train going the entire length of Death Valley, and give those in attendance an exact reproduction of this world famous valley, where emigrants of the early days endured many hardships in the hope of reaching the Eldorado of the west. It is known many of them perished for the lack of water, as the temperature registers as high as 140 degrees, and water is extremely scarce. The trip begins at Ludlow, Calif., showing the Santa Fe limited pulling into the depot. Ludlow is a town built in the heart of the desert, where nothing grows except sagebrush. A change of cars is made here, and after scenes shown around Ludlow the trip begins on the Tonopah and Tidewater railroad, going out over Death Valley and through the Amargosa canyon and up to the largest borax mine in the world, the Lila C.
 After showing the Lila C. mine in operation, the pictures are shown of Death Valley Sink, 275 feet below sea level. It is said that this is the lowest spot on earth. These pictures were taken recently and are the only pictures ever taken of this famous valley, and it will give our readers who are fortunate enough to receive tickets an opportunity to see this great valley as it is today.

CUBANS OBSERVE DAY WAR WAS STARTED WITH SPAIN

HAVANA, Feb. 25.—Cubans are today celebrating the anniversary of the commencement of the revolution against Spain, which ended by the aid of the United States, in the freedom of the island and the establishment of a republic. Although the second attempt at self-government, recently commenced, has been marred by many differences between those in power, the Cubans generally are in a joyous frame of mind and are celebrating the anniversary with rock fights and other forms of native amusements.
 At Matanzas today a great statue of liberty was unveiled and the affair was made the occasion of a mammoth celebration. The statue was executed by Salvatore Benoni, of Rome, a famous Italian sculptor, and stands in a public park facing the harbor. The sculptor is today the guest of Matanzas and took a prominent part in the dedication ceremonies. Two years were occupied by him in completing the work.
 The liberty statue stands 12 feet high, and a bronze image of Jose Marti, the Cuban patriot, forms a part of the same monument, which was accepted by popular subscription.
