WILL THE TELEPHONE USERS OF MEDFORD BE WISE AND PROFIT FROM A KNOWLEDGE OF THE UNFORTUNATE EXPERIENCE OF OTHER PACIFIC COAST CITIES WITH THE DOUBLE TELEPHONE SYSTEM?

Read This Letter From a Citizen of San Bernardino, California, Where the So-Called Home Telephone Company Was Given a Franchise Some Fifty Years Ago

That the double telephone system will prove a nuisance in Medford as it has in other cities, is a foregone conclusion. This is shown by the following letter from a citizen of San Bernardino, where it has been tried. The letter reads as follows:

San Bernardino, Cal.,
June 3, 1907.

Mr. C. O. Jamieson, Corvallis, Ore.

Dear Sir: Yours of May 25th at hand. In reply will say, you are in a tight spot and that right will go on until the end for which it was started shall have been accomplished.
