PRESIDENT TAFT WILL NOT BAR WINE AT DINNERS

WASHINGTON, March 10.—It is announced that President Taft and Cleveland are going to send delegations of white table temperance advocates to Washington to ask Taft not to serve wine at White House dinners. The question has already been irrevocably settled by Mr. and Mrs. Taft. The president never takes wine or spirits of any kind. But there are many persons in Washington to whom a dinner without wine would be like tea or coffee without milk or sugar, and Taft has decided not to force his own habits of abstinence upon guests at the White House.

RUFUS WOULD HAVE ALL TRAINS MAKE STOPS

The Oregon railroad commission has received from Sherman county a petition asking that the O. R. & N. be required to establish Rufus as a regular station, thus making it a stopping place for the through trains. At present only the local train stops there. About a year ago the commission compelled the O. R. & N. to put on the local train for the benefit of the small towns along the line, and since the O. R. & N. has complied with that order it is pretty certain that a very strong showing will have to be made if the petitioners get what they are asking for now.

M'ARTHUR SAYS LEGISLATURE SHOULD TAKE PLENTY OF TIME

"The legislature should take time to do its work and do it right, whether it takes three hours or three days," said Speaker McArthur recently speaking of the suggestion that the legislature at its special session can get through with its work in three hours. "I do not approve of the plan of rushing work. We have done too much of that already. At the regular session the bills were passed so rapidly near the close of the session that the presiding officers could not possibly read them before signing them. I am never going to sign another bill unless I read it first, and I'm not going to sign one unless there is a quorum present." McArthur is of the opinion that the legislature can complete its work in a day and a half, adjourning about Tuesday noon.

MAY ENTER OXFORD WITHOUT EXAMINATION IN GREEK

Word comes from the management of the Rhodes scholarship trust in England that in the United States competitors for the Rhodes scholarship will no longer be required to take an examination in Greek. However, a winner will be required to make up the condition in Greek before he can follow the ordinary curriculum at Oxford. This will give a student nine months in which to prepare himself to satisfy the minimum Greek requirement. This change in requirement is a recognition of the fact, by the trustees, that hundreds of American students have in the past been disqualified from competing because of their unwillingness to take Greek.

SCHOOL HELD SIMPLY TO BOOST LOCALITY

ST HELENS, Or., March 10.—The directors of school district No. 2, at Pittsburg, Columbia county, have just elected Miss Pearl Black, teacher, and John Hicks, janitor, for another year, although there is only one pupil in the district. Miss Black rings the assembly bell every morning, five days a week, for the school session, and little Willie Johnson responds. Hicks strikes the room after afternoon school. Last year there were eight pupils, but seven of them were of one family, which has moved away. Pittsburg district is progressive, though, and trying to induce settlers in some there.
