### WANT ALL OLD FLOATS SHOWN IN PARADE

The Alaska-Yukon Pacific exposition and the Oregon state commission are making a strenuous effort to secure for Portland day at the Seattle fair all the floats that will be shown in the "Spirit of the Golden West" parade at the Rose festival of June 9. This pageant will be one of the most beautiful features of the carnival, and will serve splendidly to exhibit the wonderful resources of the Oregon country, as each float, cut or christened will represent the matchless fruit and other products indigenous to the many important localities of the great northwest country. It is proposed to make the parade in Seattle an exact replica of this particular parade as given in Portland.

The floats are to be one of the chief attractions of the celebration which will be held in Seattle on "Oregon day," July 17, and through an arrangement between the exposition officials and the Oregon state commission for the Seattle fair, these 20 floats representative of the industries and resources of the various communities of the state will form the nucleus of the principal street demonstration which will take place on that occasion.

The Northern Pacific railway, in response to a request from the A.Y.P.E. officials, has agreed to haul these floats from Portland to Seattle and back again, absolutely free of charge, having been informed that the interstate-commerce commission will interpose no objection to such a plan, because the floats are to be sent to Seattle for exhibition purposes only.

In addition to the plan to have these magnificent floats appear in the "Oregon day" parade, an arrangement has been made by the Rose festival with the Oregon state commission where by they will be photographed and reproduced on lantern slides and shown in the auditorium of the Oregon building, together with a lecture on the resources of the communities represented. These lantern slides and lectures will afterwards be sent to the east and exhibited throughout the east and middle west.

### OREGON GETTING MORE COLONISTS THAN CALIFORNIA

OGDEN, March 17.—The Rio Grande passenger train from the east today brought 232 colonists for different points in Idaho, Oregon and Washington. These went over the Oregon Short Line, while 110 colonists went over the Union Pacific to California.

### RESOLUTION FOR SPECIAL ELECTION.

Be it Resolved, By the city council of the city of Medford, Oregon, the mayor approving, That there be and hereby is called a special election in said city for the purpose of submitting to the voters of said city for their approval or rejection a certain ordinance entitled "An ordinance granting to the Citizens' Telephone company its associates, their executors, administrators or assigns the right to construct, erect, maintain and operate in the city of Medford, county of Jackson, state of Oregon, and in the streets, alleys, avenues and thoroughfares thereof, subject to the approval of the city council, wires, conductors and other appliances for the transmission of electricity for telephone, telegraph and messenger service, for the purpose of carrying on a telephone, telegraph and messenger business in said city and such other matters as may be lawfully brought up at said election." That said election be held upon the 19th day of March, 1909, between the hours of 9:00 a. m. and 5:00 p. m. of said day.

That the city recorder of the city of Medford is hereby directed to give notice of said election as by the charter required in case of annual elections in said city.

The following are hereby designated and appointed as the polling places and the judges and clerks of said election:

First ward—Polling place, room 3, commercial club; judge, W. H. French; judges and clerks, Chas. W. Davis, A. C. Hubbard.

Second ward—Polling place, Hotel Nash sample room; judge, John S. Orth; judges and clerks, Wm. Ulrich, H. H. Harvey.

Third ward—Polling place, city hall; judge, G. L. Schermerhorn; judge and clerks, Scott V. Davis, H. A. Thieraff.

The foregoing resolution was passed by the city council February 18th, 1909, by the following vote, to-wit: Welch, Merrill and Eifert vs. to-wit: Welch, Merrill, Danmore and Mayor Cross 3 vs. 2.
