SELL COPPER MINE FOR OVER \$100,000

YREKA, Cal., March 17.—The Dakin group of copper mines near Happy Camp, on the Klamath river, were sold last week for a sum considerably in excess of \$100,000. The exact amount is not made public. It is known, however, that Henry Wood and W. J. Brown old-timers at Happy Camp, received \$50,000 in cash for their deal to F. H. Dakin, of Oakland, who, in turn, transferred title to John B. Parish, the noted copper expert of Denver.
 These deals were really made last week in San Francisco. The deals were filed for record here Saturday afternoon.
 The transaction is the largest real-estate sale made in Shasta county for many years and is the largest deal in copper ever made in the county.
 Happy Camp is 15 miles down the Klamath river from Yreka, the nearest railroad point. It is one of the most remote mining camps in Shasta. The sale of the copper mines for a good round sum to eastern capitalists is taken to mean that a railroad will be built down the Klamath to Happy Camp and a smelter will be erected there. In other words the copper deposit is worked at a profit.

Daniel Sully in "The Matchmaker."
 A welcome announcement for the patrons of the Medford Theater is that of the engagement of Mr. Daniel Sully in his western comedy drama, "The Matchmaker," tomorrow evening, Thirsday, March 18.
 In these days of the "hurry up" drama, when plays are hastily thrown together and put on the boards on a few days' notice, it is refreshing indeed to witness a performance which bears the marks of care and study, evidences of attention to minor details and the intelligent application of those fundamental dramatic rules which make all the difference between a good performance and the kind universally described as "rotten."
 When a play receives the unanimous endorsement of the press, the public and the public, it is safe to conclude that there is something out of the ordinary either in the play itself, the manner of presentation or the actors who appear in it.
 In "The Matchmaker," each of these three elements of interest may be said to contribute to the success of the play, but the great driving power of this comedy drama comes from its faithful portrayal of the characteristics of widely diverging types of human nature. Each character in the cast is a study in itself, from the degenerate half-breed "Hijine" to the Reverend Father Daily himself.
 Mr. Sully's conception of the role of the frontier priest appeals most strongly to the dramatic, without regard to denomination or creed; the brethren of the cloth recognize in Father Daily a type of the missionary who is fighting the good fight not alone in the outlying districts of this country, but in every land and clime. Their sympathy goes out to the Idaho pastor in his trials and tribulations and better than anyone else, the clergyman appreciates the realism of his cares and perplexities.
 Fortunately, the serious elements of the play is not allowed to predominate, as such the rich humor and delicate vein of comedy may be seen the stern, unadaptable laws of everyday life, and while the average theatergoer will carry away with him only the memory of a delightful comedy, the abstract student of human nature will note how closely the comedy is allied to tragedy, and how often in the humor the staid mingle with the tear.
