

COMMERCIAL CLUB WILL ASSIST COL. MUNDY GET RIGHTS

COMMITTEE IS APPOINTED TO LOOK INTO THE MATTER OF SE- CURING RIGHT OF WAY AND TERMINAL GROUNDS.

The Medford Commercial club at its regular meeting on Wednesday evening took steps to secure for Colonel J. P. Mundy and his associates a right of way into town and terminal grounds for his railroad to the coal fields. The matter was thoroughly discussed and the following committee with W. I. Vanter as chairman was appointed to attend to the matter and report to the club at a meeting to be held early in the coming week: W. I. Vanter, Dr. Page, P. O'Connell, E. E. Gore, J. E. Foxart, Dr. J. M. Reese and J. E. Brown.

Colonel Mundy and A. E. Reames were present at the meeting for the purpose of explaining to the club what was wanted by the coal companies. Mr. Reames spoke at some length, pointing out in detail the benefit of such a road and how it should run into the center of the city, so that would be a benefit both to the companies and to the business men of the city. He explained that this was the first thing that had been asked for by his clients. He also pointed out the advantages to be derived from the opening of this immense field of coal.

The club considered the matter most favorably, sentiment being unanimous upon the point that Colonel Mundy should be given some aid in the matter of putting in the road.

The only other matter considered by the club was that of endorsing the real estate "deeds" association, which was recently formed in this city. George Putnam read a letter he had received from Senator Chamberlain in which he stated that he would work for an appropriation for the beautifying of the Center Lake national park and would like to have a memorial of local commercial bodies advising him in the process. The president of the club stated that such a memorial would be drafted at once and forwarded in accordance with resolutions passed by the club at its earlier meeting.

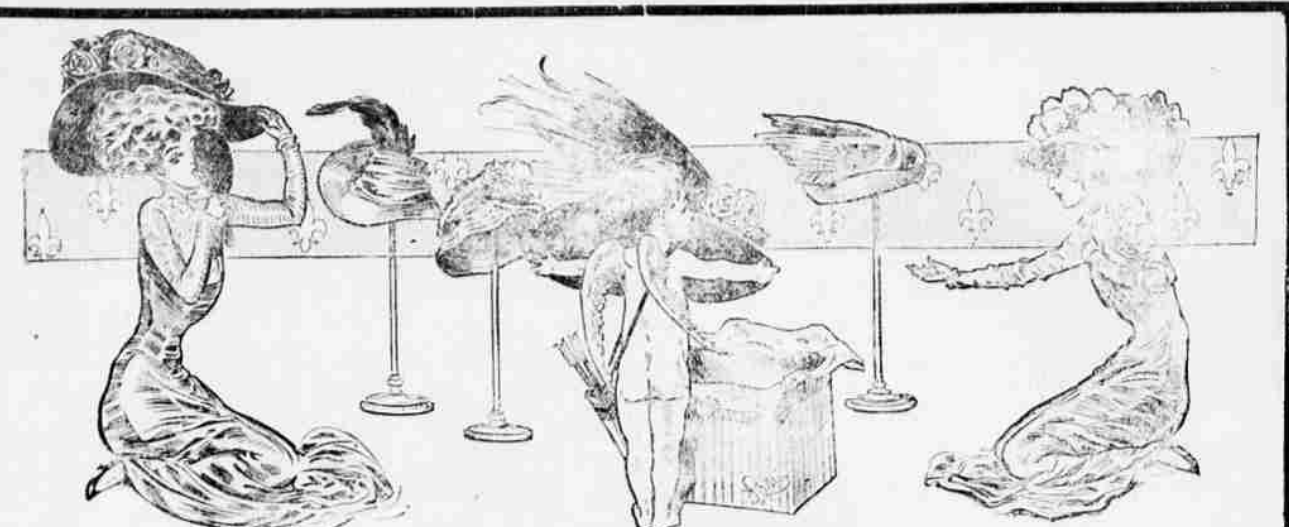
