PLANNING TO CAARY ON ACTIVE WORK IN ORIENT REGARD

ING CONSERVATION.

WASHINGTON, March 20 .- China, ften called the most backward of an tions in the care of natural resources s to be the scene of a vigorous cam paign in the interests of the forests, recording to plans for a series of meet-ings which will be held under the auspices of Boone college (Wuchang, Chi-en) at Hankhow, Wuchang and Kanyang. Later there will be neetings in all the large cities and important ports both on the coast and in the interior. Howard Richards, Jr., the representative in this country of the Chinese college, has been collecting uniterial for these courses, and has just started to Chinn. Several of the photographs showing the effect of a deforestation is China, which accompanied the president's last annual message to congress form a part of a set of stereopticol

China has probably taken less care o her forests than any other nation of the certh, and this movement to awaken in its people a realization of the impor-tance of the forest comes at an oppor-tance time. 
