A NEW SLOGAN FOR MEDFORD.

That is what has made Chicago, and it is the spirit that has made Los Angeles. It is a spirit that is too dominant here.

Let everyone preach the doctrine of buying at home.

KEEP THE TARIFF ON LUMBER.

The only tariff that materially affects the northwest is that on lumber, which it is proposed to reduce fifty per cent in the Payne tariff bill now pending before congress.

If the bill passes as drawn, it will be a serious blow to the leading industry of Oregon. Manufacturing industries of the east for many years have been recipients of a war tariff which has created a lot of millionaires at the expense of the people when there was no competition with cooie labor, as there is in the lumber business.

As long as tariff is necessary to raise revenues, the northwest should not be discriminated against, but a duty retained on lumber high enough to enable lumber and shingle manufacturers to compete with those of British Columbia, employing cheap oriental labor.

Every resident who has not numbered his residence should do so at once. Many of the numbers now on are wrong. These should be corrected according to the city engineer's plat.
