PENDLETON, Ore., March 29.—The jury holding the inquest over the remains of E. V. The old man disappeared August 1 from a train on which he was coming here to visit relatives. His skull was found later. The other day officers remaining a drift for \$1000 was discovered, indicating he was not killed by robbers.

Prepaid Railroad Orders.

"Something which is of considerable interest to the public generally and which is perhaps not generally known is the system of prepaid orders now in effect between state as of the Southern Pacific company and all points in the United States. By means of this system tickets may be purchased at Medford from any place in the United States and mailed or telegraphed direct to the party wishing to come here. Sleeper accommodations and small amounts of cash in connection with these tickets may also be forwarded at the same time."

ORDINANCE NO. 183.

An ordinance providing for the execution of a contract with the Medford Cement & Paving Co. for placing curbs and constructing strip of cement sidewalk on Central avenue between the south line of Sixth street and the north line of Eighth street in the city of Medford, Jackson county, Oregon, and providing the terms of said contract.

The city of Medford doth ordain as follows:
That the proposition of the Medford Cement & Paving company, an Oregon co-partnership, for placing a curb along both sides of Central avenue from the south line of Sixth street to the north line of Eighth street, in the city of Medford, Jackson county, Oregon, and for building a strip of cement sidewalk along said street within said limit, said strip to extend from curb to present sidewalk, be and the same is hereby accepted and the mayor and recorder are hereby authorized and instructed to enter into and sign a contract in the form and manner as hereinafter set forth, and such action by said mayor and recorder is hereby expressly authorized, ratified and confirmed.

This agreement, made and entered into this day of March, 1909, by and between the Medford Cement & Paving Co., a co-partnership hereinafter named the contractor, and the city of Medford, a municipal corporation, hereinafter called the city.

Witnesseth, That in consideration of the covenants hereinafter set forth the said contractor hereby undertakes and covenants to furnish all necessary materials and labor and do all the work of placing cement curb along both sides of Central avenue, in said city of Medford, from the south line of Sixth street to the north line of Eighth street and also to lay a cement sidewalk between said curb when so laid and the present sidewalk along both sides of Central avenue within the aforesaid limits, and to furnish said materials and labor and do said work in a first-class, substantial and workmanlike manner, for the prices hereinafter set forth, and in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor adopted by the city council for the laying of curb on Seventh street in said city, and upon the terms and conditions in said plans and specifications set forth, which said plans and specifications are on file in the city recorder's office of said city and are hereby expressly referred to and made a part of this agreement and in accordance with the plans and specifications adopted by the city council of said city for the construction of cement sidewalks in said city, which plans and specifications are on file in the office of the city recorder of said city and are hereby expressly referred to and made a part of this contract; and in consideration thereof, the said city agrees to pay said contractor therefor at the following rates:

For straight curb—40 cents per lineal foot.

For curved curb—60 cents per lineal foot.

Sidewalk—10 cents per square foot.

Alley crossings—18 cents per square foot.

It is further agreed that all of said work is to be done upon the terms and subject to the conditions set forth in a certain agreement made between the city of Medford and the Western Construction company, made pursuant to ordinance No. 160 of said city, on file in the same refers to and is incorporated in this agreement, which said agreement is expressly referred to and made a part of this agreement.

It is further agreed that the contractor shall furnish a bond for the faithful performance of this contract, to be approved by the mayor of said city, for the sum of one thousand dollars, having as surety thereon some surety company authorized to do business in the state of Oregon.

guaranteeing the faithful performance of this contract and indemnifying said city against all claims or liens for labor, work or materials on account of all sub-contractors, material men, laborers and others furnishing labor or materials on this contract.

It is further agreed that said work shall be commenced and prosecuted with all reasonable diligence and dispatch.

ORDINANCE NO.

An ordinance amending an ordinance of the city of Medford entitled "An ordinance to provide for the prevention of fires and the protection of persons and property endangered thereby; to regulate the construction, alteration and repair of buildings and establish fire limits in the city of Medford," being ordinance No. 133 of said city, as amended by ordinance No. 156 of said city.

The city of Medford doth ordain as follows:

That section one (1) of an ordinance of the city of Medford entitled "An ordinance to provide for the prevention of fires and the protection of persons and property endangered thereby; to regulate the construction, alteration and repair of buildings and establish fire limits in the city of Medford," being ordinance No. 133 of said city, as amended by ordinance No. 156 of said city, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 1. That all that part of the city of Medford, Oregon, situated, lying and being within the following limits, to-wit: Commencing at the intersection of the center line of Holly street in said city with the center line of West Eighth street; thence along the center line of said Holly street to its intersection with the center line of West Sixth street; thence along the center line of said Sixth street to its intersection with the center line of d'Anjou street; thence along the center line of d'Anjou street to its intersection with the center line of Fifth street; thence along the center line of Fifth street to its intersection with the center line of Riverside avenue; thence along the center line of Riverside avenue to its intersection with the center line of Sixth street; thence along the center line of Sixth street, extended to the meander line on the west side of Bear creek; thence along said meander line to its intersection with the center line of Eighth street, extended; thence along the center line of Eighth street and said center line extended across the railroad right of way to the place of commencement, all in accordance with the duly recorded map or plat of said city, be and the same is hereby declared to be within the fire limits of said city.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 20th day of March, 1909, by the following vote: Welch, aye, Merrick, aye, Wortman, aye and Ebert, aye, Demmer and Emerick, absent.

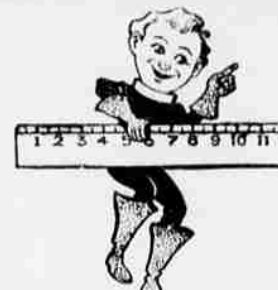
