# MUST HAVELAYS THEFT

Fleet Is Crippled Unless Alaska Coal Fields Are Developed

WASHINGTON, March 30 .- Repesentative Mondell of Wyoming in liscussing the Payne tariff bill in he house today, declared that Amercans should rid themselves immediately of the idea of a duty on coal that increases the cost of the comnodity to the consumer in the slight-

est degree.
"It is of the utmost importance," ie said, "that the coal field of Alasha be developed immediately, for unil that time the Pacific fleet will be eriously handicapped.

"Then shall the republican party leliberately and with malice aforethought, urge reciprocity arrange-ments which the Canadian government has not sought, with a full nowledge that such action will senously cripple one of the leading industries of the United States."

NEW PROCESS WILL BE BOON TO LUMBERMEN

MINNEAPOLIS, March 30.-What considered a significant industrial discovery is claimed by Dean George B. Frankforter of the College hemistry of the University of Minnesota. It means, he asserts, that the United States will produce a undred times as much wood pulp paper as was believed possible and that turned into profit.

The perfected precess consists of taking small pieces of waste wood or dust, laying them on a steel incline a chemical process of distillation arbon bi-sulphide or gasoline is soured over the sawdust, dissolving he turpentine and rosin, which pass off as gas into a coil of pipe lead-ing to a tank. The process is simior to the distillation of sugar.

The wood pulp remains free from pitch and is suitable, it is asserted, or the manufacture of paper. visting method of distillation left the pulp in the form of charcoal.
