FELL FROM NEW LAUNCH: COOS BAY MAN DROWNS

MARSHFIELD, Or., March 30.—John Fox, who had charge of E. G. Fyans' slaughter house, located on Coal Bank slough, three miles from Marshfield, was accidentally drowned yesterday. Mr. Fox left Marshfield for the slaughter house in a gasoline boat, and when near the end of his trip, something evidently went wrong with the engine and he was seen to go in and out of the little cabin several times.

There was a splash and several men ran to the shore close to the boat, but Fox was drowned before assistance could reach him. His body was recovered shortly afterward.

JAPAN DENIES HER SUBJECTS ARE SPIES

TOKIO, March 30.—A San Francisco special to the London Times which has been re-cabled to Tokyo, says that it has been completely proven that Japanese resident agents of American are acting as spies. But it adds, "every country, even the United States, employ men like these." The Japanese government officials have requested the Associated Press to make a categorical denial of the charges. The officials of the foreign office said "the statement is absolutely without foundation. As far as Japan is concerned, it is considered a silly canard which its mischievous course alone entitles to be dignified by the term, 'dementia'."

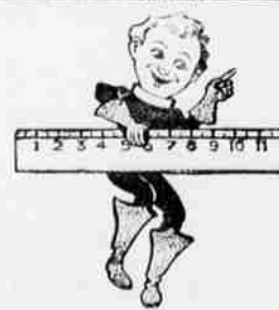
