COYOTES ARE BEING KILLED IN LAKEVIEW

PENDLETON, Ore., April 7.—There are nearly 100 less coyotes to deal with in the vicinity of one sheep range in the Lakeview country, as a result of the extermination campaign inaugurated by the sheepmen last January. There are also that many less for the state to pay bounty on, as they were killed during the winter.

The above is in accordance with a report received yesterday by Dan P. Smythe, secretary of the state Woolgrowers' association, from Dan Chandler of Lakeview. Chandler was one of the enthusiastic supporters of the plan for wholesale poisoning and reports that he found 200 coyotes killed by poison on his range and that there were undoubtedly many killed which were not found.

The work of exterminating the coyotes is now on in earnest in this section of the state. Sheepmen have arranged to board free of charge, at least one hunter in every landing range; and J. N. Burgess of the Cunningham Sheep and Land company has announced that he will board every hunter that shows up.

MILLINERY STORES RAIDED FOR PLUMES

Nine millinery stores, where the plumage of the snowy heron was on sale were raided in Portland by the president and treasurer of the Oregon Audubon society, who, accompanied by Constables Wagner and Kiernan, dashed from one establishment to another in a big red automobile and seized a quantity of plumes as evidence.

The prosecutions were brought under a law which has been a dead letter for six years.

EUREKA WANTS ROAD BUILT NEXT SUMMER

EUREKA, Cal., April 7.—Citizens of this city representing its railroad promotion committee sailed this morning for San Francisco bent on having an interview with officials of the California Northwestern railway, to come to some understanding concerning the building of the line from Sherwood, in upper Mendocino county, to Eureka. This committee believes this railroad, which will open up northwestern California, should be built this summer.

ORDINANCE NO. 188.
An ordinance creating a committee of the city council of the city of Medford to be known as the license committee, providing for the appointment of its members and prescribing its duties.

The city of Medford doth ordain as follows:

Section 1. There is hereby created a committee of the city council of the city of Medford to be known as the license committee. It shall consist of two members of the city council, to be appointed by the mayor. The mayor shall be the third member of said committee.

Section 2. All applications for licenses made to the city council of said city shall be referred to said committee for investigation and report before the same are acted upon.

The foregoing ordinance was passed March 20th, 1909, on the following vote: Merriek aye, Welch aye, Emerick aye, Wortman aye, Effert absent, Demmer aye.
