PEACHES IN OTHER SECTIONS FROST-BITTEN

PORTLAND, Or., April 8.—As reports from the peach orchards of the northwest come in to Secretary Williamson, of the state board of horticulture, it becomes evident that not more than half a crop of this fruit will be raised this year.

"There are more peach trees winter killed than I realized at first," Mr. Williamson says, "and we had to wait until blossoming time before we could come to any definite conclusion. This month shows that a great many trees refuse to bud or bloom, and the inference is that if we get half a crop of peaches this summer we will be doing well."

"Most of the damage seems to have been done east of the mountains, where zero weather ruled for a short time in January. From Willamette valley points reports are more encouraging, and few trees have been killed outright."

"Financially, the partial failure of the peach crop will make little difference, as we were not in the habit of exporting peaches, and what we raised we consumed at home. The northwest has not become known as much of a peach country, though there are favored spots that have made peach raising quite well off within the past few years."

"All other classes of fruit promise well, and I look for a particularly large yield of apples, pears, plums and grapes."

1000 CHICKENS BURN; HARLEM NEGROES SAD

NEW YORK, April 8.—Harlem negroes are sad today after witnessing the wanton destruction of 1000 fat chickens that were roasted to a rich brown, then burned to a crisp in a fire which destroyed property at the foot of East 124th street last night. The chickens were the property of H. L. Goldberg, and were confined in his poultry yard. Several negroes in the yard excitedly volunteered to rescue the fowls before death came, but they were held back by the police reserves.

TURKISH DEPUTIES FAVOR THE BULGARIAN COMPACT

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 8.—After ten hours' stormy debate, in which the Albanian deputies accused the government of selling a portion of the empire for an insignificant sum, the chamber today approved the Austro-Turkish protocol by a vote of 136 to 46. This protocol, which provides for settlement of the differences arising out of the annexation by Austro-Hungary of the provinces of Bosnia and Herzegovina, was signed at Constantinople on February 26. Under it Turkey received \$10,000,000 indemnity.

EGGED FISHERMAN WHO BROKE TRESPASS

WINSTED, Conn., April 8.—The trout season in Connecticut opened today. In Norwalk, where there is still ice on the deep pools and streams, fishermen carried a rod in one hand and an ax in the other.

Mrs. Hunt pelted the freed fisherman with eggs which she had in her apron until he was glad to climb down and retreat.
