Easter Music.

To the Editor: In your wrap-up of "Easter Services" you neglected to mention the musical feature of the service at Christian Science temple. While the people of the temple had nothing elaborate in the matter of chorus and numbers, still, on the whole, the technique and finish of the two numbers presented put them far and beyond anything else heard in the city.

Good voices and cultured were much in evidence at the Episcopal service. The musical numbers rendered at the Baptist church showed practice, and one of the leading features in their music program was the orchestration of "March from Tannhauser." This march may be remembered as one of Damroch's favorites.

At the Christian Science meeting the musical effort of both Mrs. Irene

Brown Isaacs and Miss Grace Brown showed that, not only had they each given much study to their selection, but that each was imbued with the genius of interpretation, without which there can be no known master.

In rendering her piano selection Mrs. Isaacs handled her subject well. Her interpretation had not the needless complexity and vagueness of Debussy's music, but had more the interweaving of melody and theme of ravishing beauty, perhaps much toward the style of Puccini, upon the foundation that Verdi built, yet without showing forth Liszt's influence.

In singing the "Four Square City" Miss Brown showed herself to be not only in excellent voice, but aided of her genius, to have entered fully into the meaning of the author's vision of dream.

Worthy of mention also among Sunday's entertainments was Miss Olga DeLane's singing at the Bijou. Miss De Lane has a voice of goodly range and compass and marvelous sweetness.
