### OFFERINGS OF NEW CAPITAL ISSUES FELL OFF IN MARCH

NEW YORK, April 13.—New capital issues, including bonds, notes and stocks, have aggregated since

January 1 last \$375,901,380 against \$315,450,800 in the first quarter of 1908, an increase this year of \$60,450,580. During March the offerings were comparatively light owing to symptoms of congestion having developed in consequence of the heavy output in January and February. The total for last month, according to the Journal of Commerce and Commercial Bulletin's compilation, was \$72,775,400, a decrease of \$4,859,100.
