WILL MAKE PAPER OUT OF FIR STUMPS

Smith Lumber Company of Dee Bay

MIL TEST NEW DISCOVERY.

The manufacture of paper pulp from the wood of the fir tree and some products of spruce will be attempted by C. A. Smith. Spruce is easily used for making paper, while a new chemical discovery will be employed to make possible the use of

The chemical discovery was made by Dr. George E. Franklin, a professor in the University of Minnesota, and the experiment will be directed by C. A. Smith of Minneapolis. Dr. Franklin is reported to have made in about a month, when an experimental plant will be established.

The invention is a process of dissolving by means of chemicals which removes from the fir wood those properties which can make it impossible for wood pulp. There will also be a number of by-products, among them alcohol, bordeaux and resin. From this wood Indian rubber can be made.

If the newly discovered process is successful the whole of a fir tree without the lumber can be utilized. The by-products will also be a source of revenue.
