# HUSSEY'S

**ORDINANCE NO. 189.**  
An ordinance causing the cost of construction of lateral sewer along F street in the city of Medford to be assessed against the property directly benefited thereby and adjacent thereto; declaring said assessments and directing the entry thereof in the docket of city liens.  
The city of Medford doth ordain as follows:  
That no protests having been filed against the assessment of the cost of the lateral sewer along F street in the city of Medford, notice there-

of having been given to the owners of the property thereby affected as provided by the charter of the city of Medford, the council has considered the matter and hereby declares the cost of said sewer to be assessed against the respective parcels of property in the respective amounts set opposite said respective parcels; which said parcels of land are hereby declared to be directly benefited thereby in such respective amounts in such proportion, all as hereinunder set forth in detail.

Sarah Van Dyke—Beginning at the intersection of the south line of 13th street west with the east line of Fir street South, thence north 54 degrees 30 minutes east 170 feet; thence south 35 degrees 30 minutes east; thence south 72 degrees 30 minutes west 181.5 feet to the east line of Fir street South. Said point is 271.5 feet north 35 degrees 30 minutes west of the southwest corner of the Medford Ice and Storage Co.'s lot; thence north 35 degrees 30 minutes west to the place of beginning, 309 feet frontage—\$139.05.

Medford Ice and Storage Company—Beginning at a point on the southeasterly side line of West Twelfth street in the city of Medford, Jackson county, Oregon, as designated on the official plat of said city of record in the office of the county recorder for said county, where said southeasterly side line intersects the southwesterly side line of the Oregon and California R. R. right of way; thence southerly along said right of way side line six hundred and forty-three and five tenths (643.5) feet; thence south seventy-two and one-half degrees west, two hundred thirty-one and five tenths (231.5) feet; thence north thirty-five (35) degrees thirty (30) minutes west two hundred and seventy-one and five tenths (271.5) feet to the south corner of Sarah Van Dyke tract of 1.33 acres; thence north seventy-two (72) degrees thirty (30) minutes east, one hundred and eighty-one and five tenths (181.5) feet to the east corner of said Van Dyke tract; thence north thirty-five (35) degrees thirty (30) minutes west three hundred and seventy-two (372) feet to north corner of said Van Dyke tract; thence north fifty-four (54) degrees thirty (30) minutes east fifty and five tenths (50.5) feet to the place of beginning, 271 feet—\$121.95.

And it is hereby ordered that the recorder cause a statement of said respective assessments to be entered in the docket of city liens and give notice thereof by publication as required by law and that said liens be enforced as provided by the ordinance of the city of Medford for the enforcement of liens for improvement of streets.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 6th day of April, 1909, by the following vote, to-wit: Merrick, Eifert, Emerick, Wortman and Demmer yes, Welch absent.

**FAMOUS SHASTA COUNTY MINES CHANGE HANDS**  
REDDING, Cal., April 15.—A mining deal of considerable magnitude has just been consummated in Shasta county, through the agency of James B. Joyce of San Francisco. The properties involved consist of the famous Clippers and Croesus groups of gold mines, located near Kenith, which have been acquired by the Carnegie group of mines (limited) company, which is composed of the following well known business men of New York and San Francisco: General Thomas McGregor, U. S. A., George H. Cross, Alfonso DiNola, Clifford McClellan and James B. Joyce. The transaction has just been recorded in this city and the consideration is \$140,000.

**ALBANY IS ON LOOKOUT FOR CHEAPER PAVING**  
ALBANY, Or., April 15.—A paving company of Portland is making preliminary arrangements for the paving of First and Second streets, in keeping with the contract awarded some time ago. The rock crusher has been built in the southeastern portion of the city. The rock is to be brought from quarries near Niagara, near the terminus of the Corvallis & Eastern, in the Cascade mountains. Plans are being considered for additional paving, first of Lyon street, leading from the depot to the business portion of the city, along the course of the electric line. The various kinds and costs of paving are being considered, and it is quite possible that some cheaper paving may be tried.

**DAMES AND DAUGHTERS.**  
Mrs. Helen L. Grenfel of Denver is investigating the life of shopgirls with a view to improving their condition.  
Miss Estelle Finch is the first woman to be naturalized by the Japanese home department. She was born and brought up in America, but for a long time has been connected with the Seamen's mission at Yokosuka.  
Mrs. Gaylord Wilshire is the president of the Woman's National Progressive league, which, among other things, declares its intention of creating a new literature for children with a view to fostering in children the spirit of human solidarity.  
Mrs. Thomas Withersbee Foots of the Jackson Park Yacht club of Chicago is now a certified ship's master, licensed to navigate the great lakes. She passed her examination with flying colors. She is the second. Mrs. Ogden McClurg being the first.  
In spite of the fact that the University of Moscow does not admit women students, it is to have the first woman professor appointed in Russia. This noted woman is Dr. Douchavoka, who is a graduate of Zurich and is looked upon as an authority in pathology.  
Mrs. Bertha Ayreton, widow of Professor William Ayreton, F. R. S., who died last November, is the only woman who was ever admitted to membership in the Institute of Electrical Engineers in England. She has two daughters, of whom one, Edith, married Israel Zangwill.

**Short Stories.**  
The United States now holds third rank among nations as an exporter of manufactures.  
A wreath placed on the grave of Nancy Hanks Lincoln, at Lincoln City, Ind., on Feb. 12 was paid for by one cent contributions from 2,500 school children of Indianapolis.  
About 75,000 foxskins are sold out of Maine every year. Very few of the sly animals are shot. Many are killed by the use of poisoned bait, while hundreds of others are killed in drives.  
According to the report of J. M. Lamadrid, head of the St. Andrew's one cent coffee stands, poor people of New York and Brooklyn to the number of 149,637 were served with warm, wholesome food during 1908 at the nominal price of a cent a portion.

**English Etchings.**  
In London property to the value of £1,083,333,000 is insured against fire.  
Not a single case of intoxication occurred last year among the 9,000 inhabitants of Whittlesey, Cambridge-shire.  
There is one tiny street within the city of London's limits. It contains but two houses (one on either side) and is only eighty feet in length.  
Holloway jail, to which obstreperous suffragettes are sent, is described by a London journal as a place where one fares almost as well as in a good hotel, the best of food being provided. The health of most of the inmates improves in a short time.

**Sporting Notes.**  
Cycling is gaining favor in Frisco.  
The St. Louis Americans average thirty-four years of age.  
Fred Plalsted is coaching the Western R. C. oarsmen of St. Louis. He is well known in the west.  
Stanley Ketchel, who weighs nearly 200 pounds, says Johnson is the only colored pugilist he will fight.  
Promoters of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition in Seattle, Wash., are to provide a \$25,000 stadium for the annual meet of the A. A. U. The structure will revert to the Washington university at the end of the fair.

**Law Points.**  
The unexplained presence of a child non sui juris on a dangerous railroad crossing is held, in Harrington versus Butte A. & P. R. Co. (Mont.), 95 Pac. 8, 16 L. R. A. (N. S.), 395, to be prima facie evidence of negligence on the part of its parents.  
An agreement by a man to pay his wife, from whom he has separated, a specific sum per week for support is held, in Winter versus Winter, 101 N. Y. 402, 84 N. E. 392, 16 L. R. A. (N. S.), 710, not to contravene a statute forbidding contracts which relieve him from liability to support his wife.

**Flower and Tree.**  
The Brazilian cocconut palm lives from 600 to 700 years.  
Under average forest conditions it takes more than 100 years to grow a thirty foot cedar pole.  
Tulips are very sensitive to the light. During a cloudy day they will sometimes close their petals and not open them until the sunlight returns.  
Cottonwood trees are said to grow more rapidly than any other kind of trees in the country. Their average growth is about one-quarter inch a year.

**GRANT SALOONS REOPEN; OWNERS MORE CHARY**  
SUMPTER, Or., April 15.—Since the late decision of the supreme court of Oregon, declaring the election by which Grant county went dry illegal, liquor men in that county have again started up in business. One of their first acts was to organize to uphold the law in regard to selling liquor to minors and habitual drunkards, and thereby to lessen the opposition that has prevailed against them during past years. One young man, Lawrence Ford, has already been caught in this dragnet, it is stated. He was arrested on complaint of a liquor man for supplying minors with liquor that he had secured by purchase, being of age himself.

**HARNEY AFTER GOOD INTERSTATE ROAD**  
BURNS, Or., April 15.—The county court of Harney county this week sent a letter to the courts of Malheur, Crook and Lake asking their co-operation in the building and maintenance of a permanent highway through these counties that will make easy travel the year round for carriages and automobiles, the idea being to encourage tourists and immigrants into this country while waiting for a railroad to be built.

**Vaudeville at Bijou.**
