

FOUR CARLOADS OF **MONUMENTS READY**

Company Shipping Monuments Manufactured Locally to Many Points in Oregon.

Four carloads of monuments mannfactured of southern Oregon granite will be shipped out of this city within the next few weeks by the Oregon Granite company. Two of these cars will go to Willamette valley points, the third to Roseburg and the fourth to Siskiyou and Klamath counties. The four cars represent about \$12,-000, which shows that Medford is getting the benefit of the exploitation of one of her many resources at least.

It was in the fall that the company decided to open a branch office in Eugene. Since that time many thousands of dollars in orders have been taken in and near that city. A dozen men have been at work in the shope getting the stone into shape. The first car, which goes to Roseburg, is being loaded at the present time. It will be shipped at the end of the week and a number of men under the direction of T. J. Carney will accompany it and set the work. Before this car of monuments is in place the first car to Eugene will have been shipped. The men will then place the monuments in that field and then double back to Yreka for the third car, returning to Eugene to place the remaining monuments. Other cars will be shipped north during the summer, but the four carloads must be shipped and the monuments put in place be-

fore Decoration day, May 30.
Aside from these foreign shipments a large number of monuments have been manufactured for local parties. Since the first of the year the company has been forced to keep a large force of men working to fill the Decoration day orders.

GRANT SALOONS REOPEN; OWNERS MORE CHARY
