

EXPOSITION WILL BE IVORY CITY

Gleaming White Will Not Be Used in Seattle, as Has Been the Custom.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 16.—Because nowhere on the grounds is there the glare of white, only the soft, mellow tone of old ivory, the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition, which opens in Seattle on June 1, has come to be known generally throughout the northwest as the "Ivory City."

Chicago had its "White City," and a magnificent sight it was; but blurred vision and bursting headaches were the price of gazing too long upon it. Every other exposition since the Columbia fair has made white its color, with the same painful results. Probably the A. Y. P. would have made the same mistake had it not been for the fact that many of its structures were constructed of reinforced concrete and pressed brick. The brick in which all of these permanent buildings are finished are of the tint of old ivory and, since everything at the fair is otherwise in accord, it would not have done to have finished the many plaster staff structures in white.

A Bruised Finger.

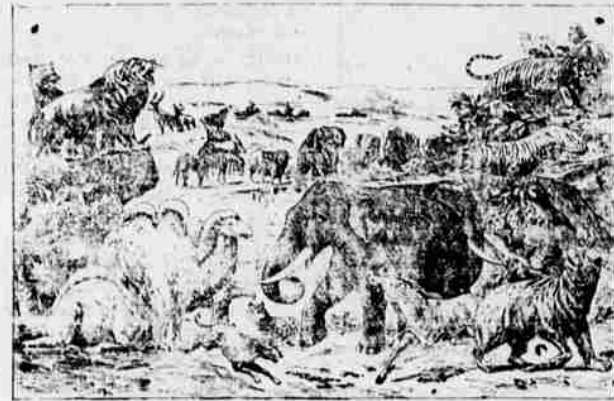
The pain of a bruised finger will often be greatly relieved by holding the finger in hot water for a few minutes.
