

CANADA TO MAKE A BIG SHOWING

Work on Exposition During the Past
Month Has Been Rapid—Canadian Exhibit Large.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 19.—One of the revelations of the past month in the development of the Alaska Yukon Pacific Exposition has been the sudden appearance of two buildings, one of them among the largest on the grounds, near the Music Pavilion on the left side of Rainier Vista at the foot of the Court of Honor. The two structures seemed to arise as if by magic, and a few days after they were first observed, the entire frame work was in place and scores of workmen were busy with exterior and interior finishing. The workers on the exposition grounds, who had supposed that all of the large buildings were already constructed, hastened to inquire about the new buildings, and learned that they are the Canadian Government Building, and the Grand Trunk Railway Building.

Canada has erected on the A. P. Y. grounds a handsome building that will contain as large an exhibit as some of the main exhibit palaces, and there has already arrived for the display, a shipment of several carloads containing the exhibit of Canada at the Franco-British exhibition at London last summer. This shipment will form the nucleus of the Canadian display, but the Canadian commissioner has gathered from throughout the Dominion, and especially British Columbia, a complete exhibit of the agricultural, mineral, timber and fisheries resources of the country.

Canada will make a strong feature of the facilities of her lands for dairying purposes, and will be a strong contender in the live stock show, which will be held at the exposition in September, and will be the gathered in the west. Canadian breeders of high grade stock have already made numerous entries for this event, and will make a strong showing against the entries from this side of the line.

The Canadian building will be completed by the end of April, leaving a full month for the installation of exhibits. The building occupies one of the choicest sites on the fair grounds, especially in regard to the view it commands. From the balcony of the building a sweeping view of the exposition may be obtained, while Lake Washington lies at the foot of a slope to the eastward and the Cascades loom up beyond. Mount Rainier is seen to the southeast, and Lake Union to the southwest, with a distant glimpse of the Olympics beyond Seattle's hills. The formal gardens a feature of the landscape work on the exposition grounds, lie at the foot of Cascade Court, and extend past the Canadian building. Nearby is the music pavilion, where the finest bands in America play during the summer.

The Grand Trunk Railway building, next the Canadian structure is a smaller affair, but very attractive in design, and will exhibit the wonderful region which this railroad is opening to the Dominion.

ASSISTANT ATTORNEY- GENERAL THREATENED

WASHINGTON, April 19.—Oscar W. Lawler, recently appointed Assistant Attorney-General, is receiving threatening letters from a Mexican "Black Hand." As District Attorney for the southern district of California it was the duty of Mr. Lawler to prosecute those Mexicans and adventurous Americans who plotted to overthrow the Mexican republic last fall. He received threatening letters at that time, but proceeded with the case, and nothing happened.

Several threatening letters have come to him since he has taken office in the Department of Justice. He will say nothing about the matter except to express a desire to meet the writers of the letters face to face. In the meantime the government is trying to discover the writers of the letters.

The First Electric Light.

John Hollingshead was the first man to use electric light in London. In 1878 he installed six arc lamps at the old Gaiety theater and started the Strand. The price of gas shares fell immediately. The cost of the lamps was \$200 a week, and he ran them for nine months. An attempt to plant one inside the theater at the foot of the grand staircase was a failure. The women objected to the fierceness of the light. One of them, for instance, "pretended to be very anxious that the secret of her soft complexion should not be discovered." Professor Erasmus Wilson said of electric light at that time, "With regard to the electric light, much has been said for and against it, but I think I may say, without fear of contradiction, that when the Paris exhibition closes the electric light will close with it, and very little more will be heard about it." Mr. Hollingshead, by the way, had fitted up the Gaiety as early as 1859 with an electric searchlight, which flashed the length of the Strand. But he soon withdrew that for fear of scaring the horses.

ELEPHANTS WILL DELIGHT PEOPLE

Norris & Rowe Are Carrying Large
Number of Highly Trained
Beasts of the Jungle.

For many seasons now, Norris and Rowe have been noted for the excellence of their trained animals and when the show exhibits here this year it will be found that they have not neglected this interesting feature with their all new big shows. CONGRESS DROPS THE "WHITE SLAVE" PROBLEM

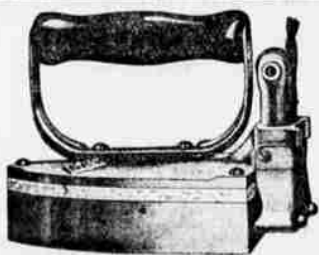
WASHINGTON, April 19.—Further attempts on the part of congress to regulate the white slave trade by punishing persons guilty of harboring an alien woman for immoral purposes have been abandoned in view of a recent decision of the supreme court of the United States declaring unconstitutional a portion of the immigration act of 1907, relating to this subject.

"When we put the provision in the law against the harboring of such persons," Representative Bennett of New York, who fathered the bill in the house, said today, "we recognized that it would probably be declared unconstitutional. But we wanted to leave no stone unturned to suppress the traffic. With that object in view, we had the department of justice draft a clause which might be constitutional, but which did not prove to be."

MARRIAGE LICENSE WAS 20 MONTHS OLD WHEN USED

BUTTE, Mont., April 19.—"Is this marriage license still good, or do I have to get a fresher one?" Victor Mattson asked the court house clerk.
