

TRANSPORTING TROOPS
VIA THE AUTOMOBILE

NEW YORK, April 29.—The quick transportation of troops by automobiles will be one of the novel features of the second annual automobile carnival beginning today. It will be the first time that anything of the kind has been attempted in this country, though several interesting "forced marches" have been made abroad.

The ninth regiment has accepted the invitation of the carnival committee to go to Mamaronock and back today. The committee has supplied all the automobiles necessary to transport the regiment, which started from its armory at 2 p. m. On arriving, the troops will line up as fast as possible, present arms and break ranks for luncheon. On its return to New York the regiment will be reviewed in Washington square.

The trip, it is considered, will have a practical value in demonstrating the difficulties and advantages of moving troops in this manner, and besides giving the men a good drill, should indicate the length of time which would be required to mobilize a given number of men and take them to a certain place, in case of a strike or other emergency.

BLOSSOM OF SOLID
WOOD IS DISCOVERED

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 29.—Through the gift of a friend who visited the remote region where it grows, Herman Silver, of Los Angeles, has come into possession of a specimen of the strangest and rarest flower known to scientists.

It is the "Rose of Hell," a gigantic blossom of solid wood, which grows only on the edges of a Central American volcano and gets its name from the Indians, who believe the crater is the entrance of Hades and the blossom a native of the regions inside.

Mr. Silver's specimen is one of few that have ever been brought to this country, and perhaps the finest. At first appearance it seems to be a tough gnarled knot of a tree which has been splintered, but closer examination discloses the fact that it has petals of wood and bark and the rough outlines of a flower. The petals, concave in form, are arranged much like the petals of a half-blown rose. Their inside surfaces are covered with fine lines, which have the delicacy of a fine hand carving. The stem, which is about a foot long, is of some unusual wood, which is light strong. It is covered with heavy

which seems to have been cracked by heat. Both flower and stem are dark brown—the color of weather beaten boughs and dry as tinder. The flower grows on a tree of great size and strength. The blossom measures about twelve inches across.

The trees grow in the crevasses on the sides of Mount Agua, a high peak among the rugged mountains of Central America and near the volcano of Fuego. The Guatemalan Indians have known of it for a long time and have associated it with the fiery vengeance of the subterranean regions.

WANTS HIGHWAY
THROUGH OREGON

Salmon King Seufert of The Dalles
Would Extend Crater Lake
Road.

F. R. Seufert, the salmon king of the upper Columbia, who rendered material aid at the legislature in securing the passage of the Crater Lake road bill at the legislature, appearing before the committee in its advocacy, writes to The Tribune as follows upon the receipt of one of the new Medford club pamphlets:

"I am in receipt of your Medford Commercial club informer. After making myself acquainted with it, I sent it on to New York for I expect when you get that road built, to see all at the best of the season and help you open that road, so that when those who visit your section return to their homes they will ask the next legislature to unroll a little more of it, until it is all unrolled, and the state highway will extend from the California line to the Washington line at the mouth of the Willamette river and then east and southeast, until it crosses the Snake at Ontario, and we can invite Washington and Idaho people to visit us over the finest highway the world ever saw.

"Keep at the good work. Raise taxes and make the improvements. No one will kick, as long as the dollars show one hundred cents' worth of improvements. The interest will come back by their use.

"We are a great people to parade and advertise our liabilities and keep our resources hid from view, but a few good roads will allow the outsiders to see what we have, and then we will have to hustle to keep it, and not rustle to sell it, for what everybody needs everybody buys.

"Some day I expect to have time to loaf, and then I want to see more than I have heretofore been able to see. I have traveled through all the rail routes, but with a good road one can see the good part of a state and what a state has to show, and it will then be a larger state.

"I hope when you get to build this road in your section, you will lend the list to hang the first man that makes himself a grafter upon this fund to one of the tall sugar pines by the roadside, and bury his body at its roots as a warning that road money must be earned.

"Any time you have a surplus of this kind of literature send it along and I will surely keep it going where it will do the most good. My kindest wishes that success is yours."

Church Drop Bible.

Owing to the growing lack of interest in the Bible on the part of the young men members of the Sunday school class of the First Congregational church of Jersey City, the church has decided to abandon the international Sunday school lessons and go in for sociology. Prohibition, protection, free trade, socialism, single tax, municipal government, social betterment and kindred subjects will be taken up instead. The church is one of the largest in Jersey City. Rev. John L. Scudder, who has become well known to the Jersey City public, because of his war on illegal liquor selling, being the pastor.

The Bible class, as a strictly Bible class, has been abandoned, and Nelson Forman elected president of the sociology class and Lester Mehrhoff secretary of the new class. C. E. Adams, a New York commission merchant, will be the sociology teacher.

MILITIA KEPT ORDER
IN WET OHIO ELECTION

CHILLICOTHE, O., April 29.—In a local option election characterized by disorderly scenes, at times bordering on rioting, Ross county voted "wet" yesterday by 2000. The city of Chillicothe gave "wet" a majority of 1800. To restore order, Company H of the state militia was called out and a large force of deputy sheriffs were sworn in. These, carrying wagon spokes instead of rifles, stood guard in the disturbed quarter until the polls closed.

PENDLETON TRIBUNE
SUSPENDS DAILY ISSUE

PENDLETON, Or., April 29.—The Pendleton Tribune announces editorially that it will suspend as a daily paper and henceforth continue as a semi-weekly, publishing each Thursday and Sunday mornings. The Tribune is one of the oldest papers in Umatilla county and Eastern Oregon, having been organized about 25 years ago.

While it has been conducted as a daily at different times during the period of its existence, for the past seven years it has been continuously conducted as a daily paper. It has also been issuing weekly and semi-weekly editions.

The Tribune has been under the editorship of ex-Governor Geer during the past three years, with one exception of the past few months, when the ex-governor withdrew from the editorial department and ownership of the paper and removed to Portland.

The East Oregonian, an afternoon paper, is at present the only daily paper published in Pendleton. For several years past the Pendleton Tribune has been owned by W. L. Thompson, with J. T. Dougal, the present editor and T. C. Warner, business manager.
