

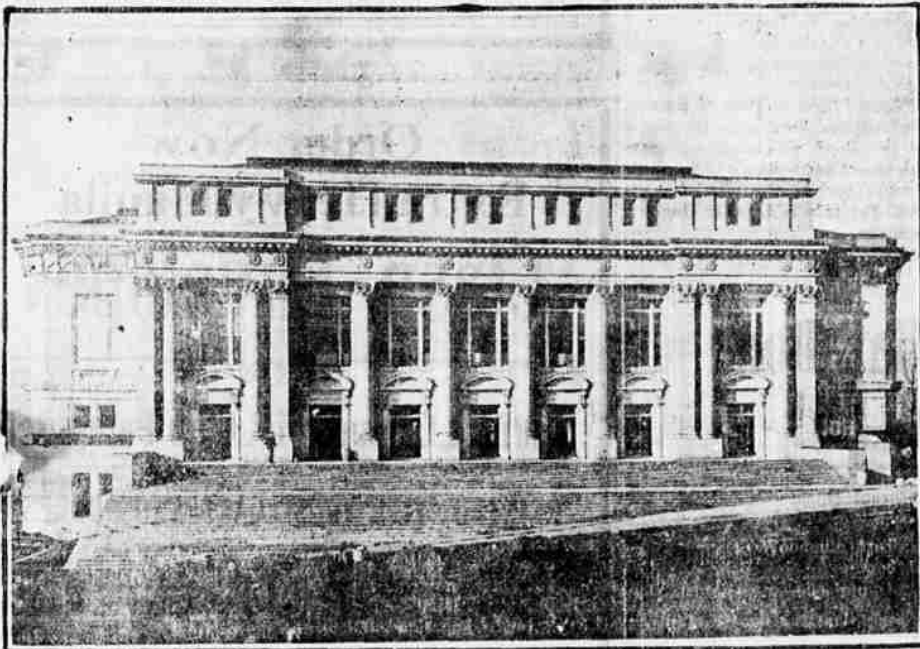

The Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition at Seattle, occupying 250 acres of the campus of the University of Washington, will not only exhibit Alaska, Hawaii and the Philippines and emphasize the importance of the growing trade with the orient, but after its gates are closed will leave seven buildings on the grounds for the use of the university. The Auditorium, one of the finest of this group, cost the state of Washington more than \$300,000. While the exposition is in progress this building will be used for conventions, congresses and conferences, and its hundreds of seats were in place and the building turned over to the exposition management three months before the opening date of the fair. Besides the Auditorium, the university will have the Fine Arts, Woman's, Arctic Brotherhood, Washington State, Forestry and Machinery buildings. A move is now on foot to take over the California building as a science hall, as well as to acquire several other buildings erected for exhibit purposes which have been constructed of heavy materials. The university will also have the beautiful grounds of the exposition for future use. The streets and walks have been paved with asphalt, and the landscape artists have made the campus a veritable fairyland.

THOMAS VS. LASALLE ON MAT TONIGHT

Wrestlers in Pink of Condition and
Excellent Bout Is Scheduled at
Angle Opera House.

Joe Thomas arrived from Portland and La Salle came in from Eugene this morning. Both men are in the best of condition for the big wrestling match which is scheduled to come off at the Angle opera house tonight. Both are equally confident of taking down the long end of the purse.

La Salle has entirely recovered from the effects of his gruelling contest with O'Connell, in which he wrestled two hours and 45 minutes to a draw, and feels sure that he will come

home with the bacon in spite of Thomas' long record of victories.

This match certainly ought to bring out a full house, and those who know the game as well as those who don't should turn out tonight, as this will doubtless be the most scientific and hard fought contest ever pulled off in Medford. Wrestling is rapidly becoming the popular sport, and legitimately so, as it is the builder of perfect physique, is clean, and has the patronage of the highest citizenship. WOOL SEASON OPENS WITH STRONG PRICES

The wool season is opening at strong prices in all parts of the west. In Montana crops are being bought on the sheep's back whenever obtainable, at 21 to 22 cents, but it is authoritatively stated that nothing above 22 cents has been received by

growers since 23 cents was realized a few weeks ago for one exceptionally fine clip. It is said that the best wools are about all bought in the state, and growers are not disposed to part with the remaining clips except at full prices.

Of the new Utah wool fully 25 per cent has been already sold on contract. In Wyoming very choice wools are being held by growers in spite of recent bids of 21 cents, but this action by the sheepmen of that state occasions no surprise, for they are usually willing to take a chance on the future market, as well as are the dealers. Cold weather is delaying shearing in the state. Western Idaho wools, which are generally excellent, are being contracted for at 20 cents.

SOCIALISTS PLAN BIG MEETING AT PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Or., April 29.—Plans for the Mitchell-Gompers-Morrison meeting to be held next Sunday morning in the exposition building, were practically completed at the meeting of the executive committee of labor union representatives. It is expected 10,000 men, representing the labor unions of Portland, Astoria and Vancouver, will be in the parade, headed by a band of 200 pieces. There will also be about 1200 members of

the socialist party in the procession. William Daly, president of the State Federation of Labor, will preside as chairman of the meeting, W. D. Haywood, ex-secretary of the Western Federation of Miners, will be the principal speaker.

Addresses will also be made by H. L. Hughes of the Spokane Labor Press and E. J. Lewis, state organizer of the socialist party.

Strawberries at \$2.40 a Portion.

Fresh strawberries from the vines is the latest wrinkle of the Ritz-Carl-
