CYCLONE KILLS FORTY IN SOUTHERN STATES

MEMPHIS, Tenn., April 30.—For the sixth time in a year, the cyclone belt of Tennessee, Missouri, Arkansas, Mississippi and adjacent states was swept by a serious storm last night, leaving 40 dead, hundreds of injured. Six hamlets were destroyed and property amounting to \$1,000,000. At Golden, Mo., four were killed and every building there leveled. The same number are dead at Horn Lake, Miss., which was destroyed. Five are dead at Young's Crossing, Tenn.
