CURBING RECKLESSNESS OF AUTO DRIVERS

NEW YORK, May 1.—The magistrates have shown that they can curb the wild extravagance of automobilists and lessen the number of fatalities from those death-dealing machines, and the public will demand that they do it. The recent great raid brought up to the courtrooms a large crowd of offenders, with an appalling accident and fatality record. The usual expectation of a fine, in some cases trivial, met with disappointment, for the parties were held for the court of special sessions under bail. That court disposed of many of the cases with heavier fines, but others were held for trial. The magistrates hinted at imprisonment, and in a number of ways showed that a more strenuous

ROSEBURG HOTEL BUYER CASHES WORTHLESS CHECK

ROSEBURG, Or., May 1.—George F. Meyer of Fort Collins, Col., who pretended to buy the Hotel McClal-

len in this city, obtained \$75 from the First National bank of Roseburg on a check on the Ladd & Tilton bank at Portland, which was returned this morning. Meyer made pretenses here of buying a \$40,000 hotel. He telegraphed to Denver for \$35,000 and the telegram was returned for a better address. This caused a delay, so he drew the check for \$75 expense money, until his money arrived from Denver. A warrant for forgery is in the hands of the sheriff. Meyer left the city last night.
