Be it Resolved, by the city council of the city of Medford, Oregon, the mayor approving, that there be and hereby is called a special election in said city for the purpose of submitting to the voters of said city for their approval or rejection five certain proposed amendments to the charter of said city, the first being entitled "A proposed charter amendment of the charter of the city of Medford, Oregon, amending section twenty-five (25) of said charter;" the second being entitled "A proposed charter amendment of the city of Medford, Oregon, providing for the levying of assessments on property benefited thereby, for laying water mains in the streets of said city, and providing for the payment of said assessments in installments and for the issuance of water main bonds by said city, irrespective of any limitation or restriction contained in said charter on the power of said city to issue bonds or other evidences of indebtedness and providing for the terms and conditions of said bonds;" and the third being entitled "A proposed amendment of the charter of the city of Medford, Oregon, providing for the assessing of real estate for the cost of streets on which said

real estate fronts in certain instances," the fourth being entitled "A proposed charter amendment of the city of Medford providing for the right of said city to take possession of real estate sought to be appropriated and condemned pending the action for such appropriation and condemnation upon making a deposit into court," and the fifth being entitled "A proposed amendment to the charter of the city of Medford providing for the assessment for special benefits of property in said city owned by any school district of the state of Oregon or by the city of Medford."

Said election will be held on the 10th day of May, 1909, between the hours of 9 a. m. and 5 p. m. of said day.

The city recorder is hereby directed to give notice of said election as provided by the charter in the case of the regular annual election.

The following are hereby designated and appointed as the polling places and the judges and clerks of said election:

First ward—Polling place, room No. 3, Hutchinson & Lunsden building; judge, A. C. Hubbard; judges and clerks, C. W. Davis and C. C. Taylor.

Second ward—Polling place, Hotel Nash sample room; judge, Chas. D. Hazelrigg; judges and clerks, H. M. Harvey and Wm. Ulrich.

Third ward—Polling place, city hall; judge, G. L. Schermerhorn; judges and clerks, H. A. Thieroff and S. V. Davis.

The foregoing resolution was passed by the city council of the city of Medford, Oregon, this 20th day of April, A. D. 1909, by the following vote, to-wit: Welch aye, Merriek aye, Emerick aye, Wortman aye, Ebert aye, and Demmer aye.
