CELLULOID COLLAR AN IOWA PROBLEM

Suggestion That Governor Carroll
Wears One and Is Discredited
by It Stirs State.

DES MOINES, May 20.—"What can you expect of a man who wears a celluloid collar?"

This inquiry has succeeded the "Iowa idea" of a tariff as the question of the hour in the Hawkeye state.

The man asking it is B. F. Keltz, who resigned from the state pharmacy board after a sharp tilt with Governor B. B. Carroll. In the Mansion Democrat Keltz was credited with attacking the governor's record by making the inquiry, which has gone broadcast over the state.

Members of the state house force, who are personal friends of the governor, gave an indignant denial to the report.

"There is nothing to it," said State Treasurer Morrow, who is one of the executive council and thinks he ought to know. "The governor always wears a linen collar."

When the governor returned today from Burlington, where he has been attending the state meeting of the A. O. U. W., he was the center of interest and his collar was examined critically. It was found to be pure linen, moderately high and fashionably cut.

"So far as I know there has never been a state official who wore a celluloid collar except Tim McCurdy, the ex-constable," said another state house official today. "The charge against the governor is cruel."

**DEALERS CAN'T SELL STALE

LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 20.—A law compelling all restaurants in the state to give notice when they use cold storage poultry and eggs went into effect today. The public can no longer be given substitutes for fresh ranch eggs that have long reposed in the refrigerator without first being advised what they are getting.

OLD GLORY HEREAFTER**

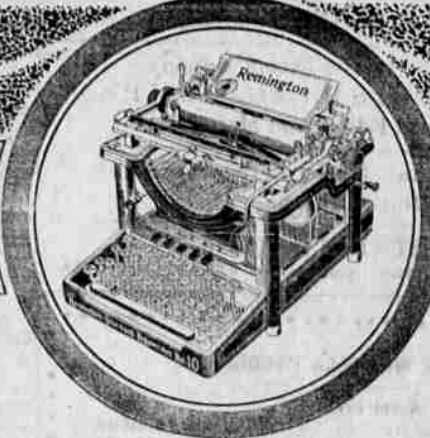
SAN FRANCISCO, May 20.—The law relative to the desecration, mutilation and improper use of the flag, passed at the last legislature through the effort of the United Spanish War Veterans goes into effect today. Hereafter all advertisements bearing the American flag will be illegal and the advertisers amenable to a fine of \$200 or a year's imprisonment.

The law was the result of the frequent use of the country's flag in advertising goods. It was flaunted on a can of tomatoes and glorified a bottle of beer. Enterprising Japanese of San Francisco used Old Glory to advertise a tea garden, and so soon men became the misuse of the country's emblem that the Spanish veterans took official action and through Senator Savage had a bill passed prohibiting such improprieties.

"The people of other countries forbade the use of their emblem in such a haphazard manner," said Edward F. Shultz, a member of the legislative committee of the Spanish War Veterans.
