

### CITY WELL CENTRAL POINT 42 FT. DEEP

New Pump Had to Be Installed to Keep Water Down to Let Men Work.

The city well had reached a depth of 42 feet Tuesday morning, when it was necessary to suspend work for a couple of days while another and larger pump was being installed, says the Herald. A four-inch centrifugal pump and a ten-horse power motor has been in use keeping the shaft free from water, and when it was found necessary to lower the pump to a position nearer the bottom of the well the flow of water was so great that it was found necessary to secure another pump which might be installed while the present one is at work keeping the water out. When the pump stopped the shaft filled with water to a depth of 12 feet in about 40 minutes and it is estimated that at the present time the well will afford nearly 175 gallons of water is now in a strata of loose, water-bearing gravel and as soon as the bottom of that is reached tunnels will be drilled in two directions to cross-cut the water veins. It is expected this will furnish an unlimited supply of fine water. The tunnels will also furnish a large reservoir capacity for storage of water. Bids will be called for the construction of the tunnels at once and the work will be pushed with all possible speed.

A crew of men for the Southern Pacific on Friday morning started to grade for a spur track south of the depot, which will afford shipping facilities for the Medford Grocery company, who are planning to erect a large warehouse near that place in the near future. The spur will be put in so that the platform of the new warehouse will be close to the freight cars that are kicked in from the main line.

Work is to start upon the erection of the new building in the very near future. It will be of brick and was made necessary owing to the fact that the company's business has outgrown the company's present quarters.

#### CLARK HAS TWO CONTRACTS FOR NEW SCHOOLHOUSES

GRANTS PASS, Or., May 21.—H. J. Clark was up recently from Myrtle Creek, where he has the contract for the building of a schoolhouse. He also has the contract for building the \$12,000 schoolhouse at Woodville, which will be erected as soon as he finishes the Myrtle Creek school. Grants Pass contractors go out of town for contracts while the people of this city send away for contractors. At Myrtle Creek Mr. Clark will manufacture the brick right at the school site, the clay being suitable for that purpose.

### CALLS NEW YORK LUNACY FACTORY

Noted Alienist Declares Number of Patients in Asylums Is On Increase.

BUFFALO, N. Y., May 21.—New York is the place where insanity is manufactured, said Dr. Albert Warren Ferris of Brooklyn, a member of the State Commission in Lunacy, in a lecture on the general phases of lunacy before the Men's Club of St. Paul's Church.

He quoted statistics showing the relative proportion of insane persons in New York to the insane population in the state. He said that in the four State hospitals in Greater New York there are 11,000 patients, of whom 4,000 are in the Manhattan State Hospital in Ward Island.

There 30,000 insane persons in the state. After giving statistics of methods employed by the state in the hospitals and the need for better conditions, he said:

"Hereditary insanity is not nearly so emphatic these days as in the past. Insanity is more hereditary than other diseases. It is a very rare thing to find a family in which there has not been an insane case on one side of the house or the other within four generations at least.

"In the large centers of population, especially New York, insanity is on the increase. This, of course, is caused by the great foreign population that is congested into the metropolis.

"Efforts are being made to stem the tide of insanity by what are called the After Care committees and the Social Service committees, which are doing good work on the congested East Side. New York is the place where they manufacture insanity. There are hundreds of paranoiacs roaming around every day in the streets of New York and other places.

#### MONEY FOR CLEVELAND MEMORIAL COMES FREELY

CHICAGO, May 21.—The committee to which was instructed the raising of \$100,000 to erect a memorial statue to Grover Cleveland is experiencing no difficulty in obtaining funds. About half of the sum has been subscribed.

### HOLABIRD BUYS ODESSA PROPERTY

Will Later Make Summer Resort of Upper Lake Near Pelican Bay.

KLAMATH FALLS, May 21.—D. B. Campbell today completed the sale of Odessa property owned by Mary Griffith to Col. W. H. Holabird. This beautiful place, situated on Pelican Bay, Upper Lake, lies four miles south of Pelican Lodge, and has for years been a widely known summer resort.

The personal property was reserved by Mrs. Griffith. Possession will be given soon to the new owner and the hotel will be closed.

Mr. Holabird says that when the proper time comes, a modern hotel, catering to the best class of tourist travel, will probably be built at Odessa, and the wagon road leading to Crater Lake made as good as possible.

By owning both the 502 acres at Pelican Lodge and the 480 acres at Odessa, drainage canals can be economically made to redeem all the marsh belonging to the two places, turning them into timothy hay meadows.

Of course it is known that Mr. Holabird is the special representative of E. H. Harriman, and it may be that Mr. Harriman is the real owner. The Pelican Lodge property still stands as W. H. Holabird the record owner, and he takes title to Odessa.

The two properties unquestionably comprise the very best summer resort location in Eastern Oregon. It is not known what price was paid Mrs. Griffith, but it must have been a pretty stiff one.

#### Prepaid Railroad Orders.

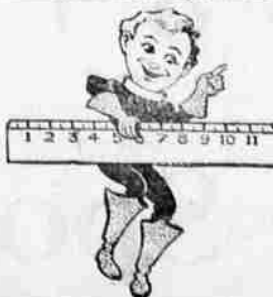
