BALLINGER TELLS ABOUT GROWTH OF GOVERNMENT

NEW YORK, May 28.—Richard A. Ballinger, secretary of the interior, was the principal speaker before a gathering of members of the Zeta Psi fraternity at the Hotel Astor. Mr. Ballinger said:

"The growth of government agencies is enormous. The appropriations of my own department amount to more than \$180,000,000 a year and there are 4000 employes scattered throughout the country.

"It is entirely beyond the power of one individual to oversee all the details of the work. In the course of its development every department has taken upon itself a tremendous system which is becoming more and more difficult to control. Agencies are growing extremely broad and vast in extent, not alone in the federal government, but also in state and municipal government.

"There is today a cleaner and healthier civic sentiment throughout the United States than ever before, and I think that there is nobody who is more responsible for it than Theodore Roosevelt."

JOHNSON THINKS "JEFF" IS TOO OLD

NEW YORK, May 28.—Jack Johnson, the colored heavyweight champion pugilist, made this announcement from a box in a local theater last night:

"The public nor anybody in this house will live to see James J. Jeffries and Jack Johnson fight. Jeffries is a pretty old man—too old to get into condition. He carries too much fat. I am confident and positive that the public will never see Johnson and Jeffries fight. I am going to California to fight Al Kaufman."

ROGERS' WILL FILED WITH PROBATE COURT FOR ACTION

NEW YORK, May 28.—The will of H. H. Rogers, disposing of between \$50,000,000 and \$75,000,000 has been filed here in the probate court. Excepting a bequest of \$100,000 for a permanent school fund for his home town, Fairhaven, Mass., the entire estate goes to relatives. To the widow the will gives the New York residence, stables, automobiles, and trust fund that will not be below two million and a half, nor above three millions. Trust funds aggregating \$550,000 were created for the benefit of relatives to be paid to beneficiaries during their lives and revert to the estate after their deaths.
