Probably 2000 delegates will be in attendance. Questions of importance will be considered during the session. The leading men of the denomination will address the gathering. The meeting will last the greater part of a week.

TEACHERS TO AID FORESTRY BUREAU

Teachers throughout the country have been invited by the United States Forester to co-operate with the Forest Service in an effort to obtain more definite knowledge of the characteristics of the most important forest trees of the United States. To do this it will be necessary to obtain a large number of volunteer observers who will collect material on the time of leafing, blossoming and fruiting of the various kinds of forest trees. In his letter inviting the co-operation of the teachers, Forester Pinchot says:

"Knowledge of this kind is greatly needed and will be of value from the standpoint both of education and of practical forestry. For educational purposes the result obtained for each species, averaged and presented graphically by means of colored charts, will be available to all who are interested in the subject, and particularly to schools. They will form a valuable 'tree calendar,' and will be valuable aids to nature study.

"Children can be readily interested in the actual work of obtaining records. This should form an attractive out-door feature of the school work that should serve to develop the faculty of accurate observation, and at the same time to promote the interest in forestry which may lead to a better appreciation of its aims and methods. It may also prove to be a profitable addition to botany courses for older students."
