TO LAKE TAHOE BY STATE ROAD

PLACERVILLE, June 2.—There is considerable inquiry relative to the conditions of the state road to Lake Tahoe from this city to the lake.

Up to the present time this season no autos have crossed the summit over into Lake Valley, though one party claims to have done so. But no machine has succeeded so far in getting more than a couple of miles above Strawberry. There are several feet of snow on the summit yet, but this is rapidly turning into slush, and owing to the fact that large bands of stock are almost hourly, during the daylight, passing over the road, the snow will soon be off and the road open.

It is believed that the road will be opened clear to the lake by June 10. The remainder of the road is, of course, passable, but the new sprinkling outfits are not yet ready and working. Supervisor Hughes with a gang of men are erecting tanks of intercepts along the line and arranging to get water to them. In a few days the team hauling the big sprinkler will be working. Four-horse teams will be used. The carts have been ordered by State Engineer Ellery and are daily expected.

Bids have been received from several teams who want the eight-hour job of keeping down the dust on the road offered by the state. These bids have been forwarded to Ellery for his consideration and contracts will soon be signed.

However the road is in prime condition as regards to dust now, as the recent rains wet down the road in good shape. J. H. Arnold was up the road to Slippery Ford Friday, which is on this highway. He went in a White steamer and reported that he found the road in good condition for thirty miles. The two White steamers for the Ruppel stage line have arrived, but no attempt to cross over the summit has yet been made.

OREGON IS TO BE COUNTED RIGHT

WASHINGTON, June 2.—Senator Chamberlain has been assured by the director of the census that for the enumeration of Portland and Oregon an adequate force will be provided, in view of the enormous increase in population since 1900 enumeration. Chamberlain urged the census bureau to make special arrangements in view of the probability that Oregon will have in 1909, while Portland if properly counted should show at least three times the 92,000 returned in 1900. Chamberlain told the census bureau that if Oregon were properly cared for as the conditions demanded the state would have three if not four congressmen after the next apportionment.

BREWERS PLAN TO WORK REFORMS

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 2.—There will be decided reform in the conduct of the liquor business in this country, to offset the onslaught of the "drys" if the United States Brewers' association has its way. Members of the association representing about 75 per cent of the beer business of the country are in attendance at the annual meeting convened today at the Hotel Shelburne.

One of the most interesting reports before the convention is that of Col. Jacob Ruppert, Jr., who recently made a tour of investigation through the prohibition states in the south and west. Commenting on the results of his observation, he said: "I found that the spread of prohibition tendencies in the west and south is ill-considered and hasty. Disastrous results, economical and moral have followed in its wake.

"No doubt in the west and south as elsewhere, there are objectionable, law-breaking, disorderly saloons and hotels. These places could have been exterminated by the enforcement of existing law or by action strongly asserted, instead of restricting the liberty of the entire community.

SAYS IMMIGRANTS ARE USE AGAINST UNIONS

NEW YORK, June 2.—The executive council of the American Federation of Labor will meet here June 15, to consider the restriction of immigration. The Central Federated Union of New York, Sunday instructed a committee to obtain data and confer with the executive council. L. A. Caskley, chairman of the committee of immigration of the Central Federated Union, said: "Many of the employment agencies are now doing an enormous business in sending immigrants to all parts of the country as strikebreakers. The American Federation of Labor desires all the information that can be obtained on this with the view of breaking up the practice."
