

### GETTING READY TO PAVE IN ASHLAND

ASHLAND, June 2.—Officials of the Warren Construction company, which has the contract for paving with bitulithic, Main street from Helman to Fourthstreets, from Main to A have been in Ashland the past few days taking preliminary survey of the field and will return in a few days to locate the most convenient supply of rock available for base and get ready for active operations, which it is hoped to get under way by June 15. Considerable heavy machinery has to be assembled here for the job. The curb contractors are only waiting for orders to begin their part of the job which is preliminary to the paving.

The work of construction here will be in charge of Mr. Copeland as superintendent for the Warren Construction company, while the supervision on behalf of the city will be given by Mr. Hoag, from Albany who has arrived and will report for duty tomorrow.

The beginning of actual operations in street paving promises to mark an epoch in the history of Ashland and it is predicted that the completion of the first contract will only be the beginning of such work here. So mote it be.
