**SALEM FRUIT CROP IS POOR**

SALEM, June 2.—According to the advice received by local packing houses and commission merchants, this season promises to be an off one for all varieties of fruits, except cherries, which will yield a good crop. The yield of prunes, apples, pears and all kinds of fruits including strawberries loganberries raspberries etc., will be small. With the exception of small fruits, which are sadly in need of moisture there is no accounting for the general backward condition.

The same is true on hay and grains of all kinds with the possible exception of Fallsown wheat, which shows good growth and will yield a fair crop. Spring-grown wheat is suffering severely from the long continued dry spell, which was practically broken by the recent showers. The spring-grown wheat is scarcely out of the ground in many localities, and if a good rain does not come soon will not be cut at all, either for grain or hay. The hay crop is not showing up very well and there are already assurances that the crop will fall far short of the average.

The prune trees in all sections of this part of the valley, and in the western portion of the state in general have a good setting of fruit but while some of the prunes have kept pace with the season in growth and development a large percentage of them are still small and stunted in growth. If these latter drop later in the season, it is predicted that there will not be more than a half a crop of prunes this season. The average crop for the state is between 20,000,000 and 26,000,000 pounds. Reports from the southern portion of the state indicate that conditions are even worse there than in the valley.

**200 CONVERTS AT ALBANY EVANGELIST UNION**

ALBANY, June 2.—Evangelists Johnson is stirring things in Albany. About 200 converts have been the result of the evangelistic meetings to date. It is said that 2500 people heard his sermon on Tuesday night on "Popular Amusements." Volley after valley was fired at each and every form of amusements. Dancing theatre going, the card table, use of tobacco and things of lesser evils were characterized as things of the devil and sinful in the extreme. Some of the business houses have closed during the afternoon between 3 and 4 o'clock so as to give the clerks and proprietors an opportunity to attend the afternoon meetings.

**PUPILS AND TEACHERS HELP TO BEAUTIFY CITY**

EUGENE, June 2.—The pupils and teachers of the Eugene public schools are lending a hand in the beautification of the city's park at the South

ern Pacific railway station in this city. They will contribute the funds for the purchase of three huge flower pots or vases of stone, which have been ordered from a Portland firm. The vases will be more than two feet high and about 32 inches in diameter. They will be set on pedestals at prominent places in the park. The park is now completed, the cost being something like \$4500, the cost being jointly born by the Commercial club and the railroad company. The ladies of the auxiliary of the club are now raising money to erect a \$1000 drinking fountain at the head of Willamet street, near the passenger depot.

**"INFERNAL MACHINE" A BULLFROG IN A BOX**

It contained nothing but a two-pound bullfrog, from which the alarming noise had emanated.

**RENOVATING THE ASHLAND EXHIBIT**

ASHLAND, June 2.—The exhibit building at the depot has recently undergone improvements in several important particulars. It has been painted both inside and out, new shelves added and it is expected that early this week linoleum will be laid on the floors, so that taking altogether both building and contents will make a much better showing.

It seems that the land on which the structure is situated is leased from the railroad company year by year, but for several years past the covenant has been more honored in the breach than the observance. The lease expires this month and the company stands ready to cheerfully renew it without question. If the building is enlarged it is proposed to extend 20 feet on the west, but this is a contingency not to be undertaken at present.

There is a well-founded rumor current that the Civil Improvement club will take over the control of the property at an early day, and if so, the lady patronesses of the institution

will give the attention it deserves, for it will be made an attraction worthy the visit of the army of tourists to and fro. A "flower girl" will undoubtedly be installed on the premises, the building will be kept open more of the time, and greater attention paid to the display of floral specimen and fruits peculiar to their season. These advantages, supplemented by a bureau affording information regarding the city and its immediate vicinity, will make of the Exhibit building a practical as well as ornamental exponent of publicity that can accomplish more and better results.
