

BEVERLY PEOPLE BOOST PRICES

Prepare to Reap Rich Harvest From
Members of the President's
Party

WASHINGTON, June 5.—The good people of Beverly are already boosting their prices in anticipation of the coming of the President. Word comes to Washington that the hotels have doubled their rates, that the liverymen have followed suit, and that the tradespeople generally are preparing to take in money with both hands as soon as the Taft party arrives and the little town becomes the summer Capital of the Nation. Unfortunately for these plans of golden harvest, Beverly is too near Boston, and the members of the White House electrical force who have been ordered to go Beverly this summer are now negotiating with the hotel managers in the larger city.

"We just simply won't be stung by the Beverlyites," remarked one of the President's clerks. "We are willing enough to pay reasonable rates for room and board for ourselves and families, but when it comes to buying the hotels every week, we side-step. Three or four weeks ago one of the President's secret service guards made a trip to Beverly to look over the ground and to make arrangements for accommodations for the crowd. He found the town as smiling as a breakfast chip. Oh no, there would be no attempt to hoist prices.

"The secret service man came back to Washington and made his report and half dozen of us thought we could stand the tariff. But to and behold when I wrote on to Beverly a few days ago, I discovered that the rates had jumped. Instead of \$13 or \$14 for a suit, the hotels demanded \$20 and the suits themselves had dwindled from four rooms to two rooms. The parlors had been cut off and what was worse the table board had leaped from \$12 to \$20 a week. It requires no lightning calculator to figure that it would cost no less than \$30 a week to enjoy life in Beverly, so we have concluded that we will make our home in Boston. We can get there in half an hour by trolley and there are no end of cars on the daily schedule.

MORE HARROWING LESS WATER NEEDED

Professor Smith Gives Timely Advice Regarding Care of
Orchards

More harrowing and less water on the land is advocated by Prof. Cyrus L. Smith, a fruit grower and institute lecturer of Eastern Washington to produce the best results in upland orchards. He also favored thinning the fruit to secure uniformity in size and to prevent over-production, thus assuring crops yearly. By keeping the ground free from weeds and harrowing once a week during the growing season, thus making a mulch of the dry surface earth, the natural moisture can be conserved sufficiently to grow fruit that will command the best markets.

Professor Smith presented those views in the course of an address to a class of students at the Spokane Young Men's Christian Association. He said:

Cultivation Necessary.

"When the season is a favorable one great percentage of large apples may be grown with little cultivation; but the grower who neglects to cultivate well every year will often fail to secure marketable fruit during the very seasons when prices are the best. The most successful orchardists are those and every year.

"Last season was the driest for many years, and yet whenever the cultivation was thorough and intelligent the results were satisfactory. In fact, the size and quality were without exception a fair index of the method and thoroughness of the cultivation. In one orchard 16 years old, we secured more than 60 per cent of four-tier apples of such varieties as Baldwin, Greening, Spitzenburg and Ben Davis. This orchard was plowed early in April. The plowing was done deep in the center of the rows, eight to ten inches, and four to five inches close to the trees. The ground immediately around the trees was then dug over with a mattock, then disked cross wise of the plowing twice, then run over with a clod crusher, then harrowed. Afterward was harrowed every week from May 1 to August 15, altogether making nineteen cultivations at an expense of \$6.50 an acre for man and team and \$2 for hand work, or a total of \$8.50 an acre.

Expense Justified

"While it might seem somewhat expensive and intensive, the results more than justify the economy of the continual cultivation as in another orchard where all the conditions were the same and the cultivation was the same except one disking and three harrowings were omitted, saving \$1.25 in expenses, there was a difference of more than \$50 an acre in the value of the fruit. Another orchard of the same age, the same varieties, the same soil, was disked twice and harrowed twice and produced only ten per cent of marketable fruit.

"Owing to the fact that less than 10 per cent of the orchards are as well cultivated as they ought to be, you will pardon me for repeating what I have so often said: 'The soil from October to April should be loose as possible to catch and hold the moisture.' From April to October maintain continuously a fine dust mulch over the entire surface. If this is done there will be no weeds and unnecessary loss of moisture.

"If because of rainy weather, which does sometimes happen, or if for any other cause whatever, the ground gets hard or weedy, disk and clod crush until the surface is a fine dust, free from weeds and then maintain the dust by continuous harrowing.

"When a cover crop is to be used seed it at the last cultivation as near to the middle of August as practicable.

"To secure fruit uniform in size, to prevent overbearing and obtain annual crops it is necessary it is necessary to thin the fruit radically. It is better to hire someone to do this by the hour or day. Few men have the time to thin their fruit as it ought to be done. If the pruning has been properly done and the fruit spurs are properly distributed over the entire tree, then thinned so the apple will not

COSTS MONEY TO FEED THE ARMY

Steady Increase Noted in Prices During Past Few Years—Can Cut Them.

WASHINGTON, June 5.—An attempt to cut down the estimates for the Army appropriation for the forthcoming fiscal year, in accordance with President Taft's policy of retrenchment the secretary has run amuck of the army ration. Despite coaxing, coddling and threats, it will not down. It stands insolent and pug-nacious in the way of all reductions and cannot be shooed or driven to cover. In ordinary perspective it is but an insignificant thing, a matter of "two bits" or less, but its omnipresence makes it a thing of commanding importance. Placing the Army at a low estimate of 50,000, there must be 50,000 rations every day for 365 days every year.

In size the rations remain the same—so much beef, so many prunes, so much flour and other articles of food—but in the last few years the price of the rations have crept up steadily. For the fiscal year of 1907 it was 22 cents; for 1908 22.5 cents; for 1909 22.5 cents; for the fiscal year of 1910 it will be a little less than 25 cents. With this rate of increase it will cost the government of \$1500 more to feed the Army this coming year than it did this year, and if the rations keep on mounting upward in price heaven knows where the additional expenses will stop.

The criticism of incompetency or indiscriminate buying made against manager of the ordinary domestic household does not apply to the subsistence department of the Army. It is probably the most perfect organization of the kind in existence and the vagaries of the market does not effect it. It is able to purchase supplies in the most advantageous way so that it is probable that the ordnancehousewife finds her increase in the cost of household supplies doubly or trebly greater than that of the Army rations.

The rise in cost is general. Meat probably shows the greatest increase but flour, coffee, vegetables and sugar are all more expensive than they were a year ago.

Summer School
