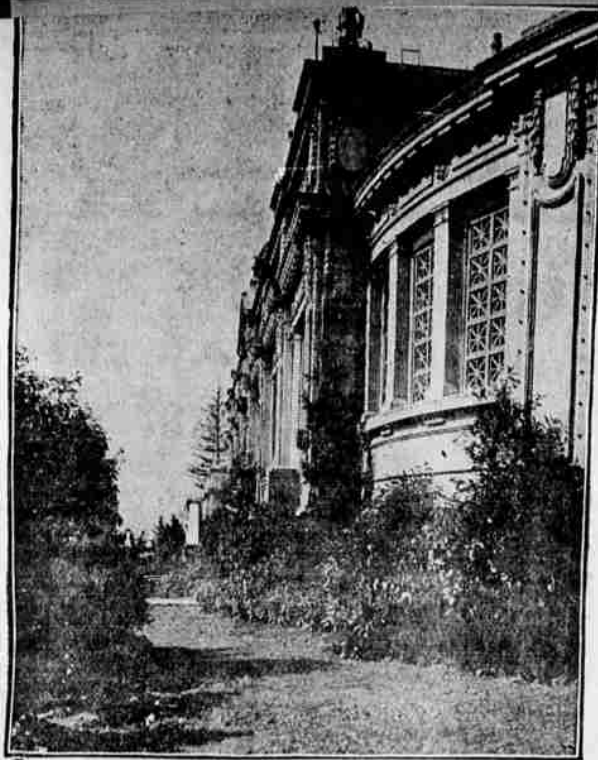




A FACADE OF THE ORIENTAL EXHIBITS BUILDING AT THE ALASKA-YUKON-PACIFIC EXPOSITION.

To relieve the formality of the ground plans of the exposition as much as could be of the native fir forest and undergrowth was left to line the walks and ways. An example of this treatment is to be found in the front of the Oriental building. There are fir trees, huckleberry, wild Oregon grape and other native growths, among which have been planted bright flowered annuals, which will be in full bloom during the exposition period. The Oriental building itself will cover such of the oriental exhibits as are not cared for in Japan's splendid palace and in the Chinese building. This idea to preserve as far as possible the natural features of the site of the exposition is somewhat of a novelty in exposition building, and it is agreed universally that the result amply justifies the scheme. The scene of the exposition itself is so rich in landscape effects that even if no artificial adornment had been attempted the outcome would have been picturesque in the extreme. In laying out the grounds this fact was borne constantly in mind, and the supervising landscape gardener and his skilled assistants have produced nothing which conflicts in any way with the original natural beauty of the spot.

SAYS CANNIBAL IS MOST SENSIBLE

London Educator Declares Ideal Food For Man is Human Flesh

CHICAGO, June 5.—The London special cable to the Tribune says: Scientific justification of cannibalism was propounded by Professor Dr. Gowland Hopkins in an address to the Royal Institute.

"What would be the most efficient protein than when fed with any other although not a point of practical dietetics," he answered himself, the most sensible in this connection is the cannibal. In consuming his own he is eating the right stuff, though it may seem gruesome.

"The experiment of a worker in Heidelberg University just lately proved this point. He found that a dog when fed with dog was able to do with much smaller quantity of protein than when fed with any other protein.

"Whatever there is in the chemistry of species, the more nearer the two species of animals are together the more nearly does the chemistry of their bodies agree."

GEORGE BERLIN NOW IN TOMBS OF PRISON

NEW YORK, June 5.—George Berlin, vice-president of the United copper company was taken to the tombs prison here today and must remain there under the orders of Judge Lacombe of the United States district court until the missing books of the company containing the evidence in the case of E. A. Heinze are produced. Similar punishment hangs over San of the company whose case will be further considered by Judge Lacombe tomorrow.

Both men are alleged to have permitted the spiriting away of books that were placed in subpoena. Berlin testified before the Grand Jury that he overheard Robinson and one to remove the books and interposed no objections. Lacombe held that he is in contempt for standing "idly by while men were planning for the removal of the books wanted in the Grand Jury's investigation." STATISTICS ON NATION'S GROWTH

Population Increase 193, Wealth Increase 563, and Debt 2375 Per Cent

NEW YORK, June 5.—Among the peculiar facts concerning the growth of the United States from 1858 to 1908, noted in the annual report of the New York Chamber of Commerce soon to be issued the following increases are observed:

Population, 193 per cent; the wealth of the country 563 per cent, public debt 2375 per cent, the per capita debt from 1.51 to 10.76 bank deposits 3460 per cent; receipts from the government 1816 per cent; war expenses 394 per cent; Navy expenditures 745 per cent; imports per capita from \$8.35 to \$13.70; exports per capita from \$2.04 to \$9.14; and the consumption of wines and liquors 266 per cent, or from 6.42 to 23.25 per capita gallons.

Foreign commerce carried in American ships decreased 39.06 per cent.

SILVER STRIKE MADE IN ACIENT TUNNEL

RENO, June 5.—All of Reno was excited recently over the reported discovery of a wonderful silver mine at Poceville, a desert mining camp on the slope of Peavine mountain, ten miles from Reno. Many men left the city yesterday afternoon and last evening to locate claims in the vicinity of the strike and it is believed that there will be an exciting stampede into Peavine before many more days have elapsed.

Peter Lynch, an old Comstock miner, who was once the possessor of a large fortune, and who discovered the Lady Bryan mine on the Comstock, made this new discovery and all who have seen his ledge states that he has a bonanza. It is claimed that he has a ledge four feet wide that will assay from \$1100 to \$2000 a ton clear cross.

Litch entered Poceville last October and began work at the end of an old deserted tunnel 400 feet long. He believed that the men who had drilled the tunnel had penetrated the mountain above the ledge and therefore began sinking a shaft. It was only last
