TWENTY EXCURSIONISTS DROWNED IN RIVER

NEW ORLEANS, June 7.—Twenty persons were drowned last night, when a pier at Mandeville, on the north shore of Lake Ponchartrain, collapsed. Most of the victims were women and children. Ten bodies have been recovered. One hundred and fifty excursionists were on the pier, which was frail and weakened by its load, collapsed when the steamer Margaret bumped into it, hurling the crowd into eight feet of water.
