

ATHLETES COMPETE IN FAIR CONTEST

A. Y. P. Exposition Scene of Inter-collegiate Contest Between University Teams.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 8.—Fifty athletes representing the six leading colleges of the northwest, and all in the pink of condition from a spring's training, will compete in the greatest inter-collegiate meet ever held on the Pacific coast, both in the number of contestants and their records, at the stadium of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition at Seattle on June 12.

For the first time the leading athletes of all of the colleges of the northwest will be pitted against each other in one big track meet. No contestant in the entire contest is a poor athlete, as the men have all been chosen as the best in their respective colleges. The colleges which will enter teams, each institution being represented by from six to fifteen men, are the University of Washington, the University of Oregon, the University of Idaho, Washington State College, Oregon Agricultural College and Whitman College.

AUTO BOULEVARD TO TOP OF TABLE ROCK

A scenic automobile boulevard to the top of Table Rock is planned by residents of Tolo, Gold Ray, Table Rock and Sam's Valley. A petition has been prepared and will be presented to the county court for a county highway connecting Gold Ray and Bybee bridge, around Table Rock, with a branch to the top of the rock, where one of the most beautiful views in the world can be seen.

It is estimated that the road will cost \$3000. Of this amount \$1000 has been subscribed by residents of that section, who claim that the road will make accessible to Medford the Evans creek country, whose outlet is now toward Grants Pass.

The residents of Evans creek, Sam's valley, the Meadows and that region will be able to come to Medford across the new steel bridge at Gold Ray, thus saving a considerable distance, besides being able to travel in winter, which is sometimes now impossible.

"SEE MEDFORD AND BUY", SAYS EDITOR

Hugh Hume, Who Visited Rogue River Valley Last Week, Prints Some Fine Things.

Hugh Hume, editor of the Portland Spectator, Oregon's high class weekly, who spent two days in Medford last week, has some nice things to say about the Rogue river valley in the last number of the Spectator, under the caption, "Prosperous and Growing Medford." He says:

"What's that line—something about 'See Venice and die?' I have a better: 'See Medford, and buy.' There is hardly a more beautiful valley in the world, not even excepting that vale in whose bosom the bright waters meet, than the valley of the Rogue, where Medford sits amid her widespread orchards of apples and pears, vineyards and gardens, and ranches and alfalfa fields that stretch smiling and opulent from foothill to foothill. Nature has been kind to the valley of the Rogue in scenery, climate, and soil; the slightest effort of the husbandman is generously rewarded there; and orchards and gardens and fields that are cared for produce a golden harvest. The valley is dotted with beautiful homes, where art and nature have combined to make life comfortable and happy. The country home of the Barreille is a show place for strangers; everybody is taken to see the Gordon Voorhies, Fred Hopkins and Hunt Lewis houses and bungalows, and everybody is surprised to see so much of what is best in the city amid what is most charming of the country.

Rapidly Growing City.

"Medford is a rapidly growing city in which the spirit of progress is shown in fine buildings, beautiful homes, clean and well paved streets, contracts for a boulevard which the Warren Construction company will build from the newly made city park to historic Jacksonville. Medford has more automobiles than has any other city of its size in the world; in two days there, I did not see a house for rent; the number of business blocks and homes in course of construction is astonishing; even the Episcopal church has been forced by the flow of commerce to move back and give its place on the block to a brick building intended for business, in which the stores are already rented.

The Tribune Praised.

"The city has the best daily paper, the Tribune, between Portland and San Francisco, and I am told there are no populists and few mosquitoes in Medford. The Tribune sees to that. At the Nash hotel, which for years was surrounded by the pick and shovel with which the hotel's builder dug his ore and the pan in which he washed it, you can get as good a dinner as is to be had in Portland. The people of Medford are planning a country club, with golf, tennis, polo and social features. The membership is there now. Medford has drawn from the world many very charming people, whose chief aim in life seems to be to make the strangers within their gates happy."

ARRANGE PROGRAM FOR GLORIOUS FOURTH

Automobile and Horse Racing are to Be Features of Celebration. Interesting Events.

At a meeting of the firemen Monday evening the following Fourth of July program was arranged, subject to change later on:

Salute at sunrise.
Parade, led by Medford band, at 10 o'clock.
Ball game at 10:30.
Automobile race about 1 o'clock.
Ball game at 2 o'clock.
Horse racing between 3 and 4 o'clock.

Free for all, trotting or pacing, purse \$100.

Three-year-old trotting, purse \$50. Running race, free for all, purse \$50.

Buggy race, purse \$75.

Pony race, purse \$25.

Entrance fee, 10 per cent of purse.

All Kinds of Prizes.

There will be all kinds of races for the small boys and the grown-ups to indulge in at intervals during the day.

Two good ball games—one in the forenoon and one in the afternoon.

Firemen's drill and hose race will follow.

In the evening, grand display of fireworks.

Dance in a 50x70 foot pavilion during evening.

Following are the automobile races, together with the route they will travel:

Automobile Races.

First race—Class A runabouts—Rules: Entrance fee, \$10; two men in each car; each car must be numbered and leave in order of numbers at intervals of five minutes; must enter car by July 1; prize \$50.

Second race—Class B touring cars—Rules: Same as in class A; prize \$75.

Third race—Class C, any local car in Rogue river valley—Rules: Same as in class A; prize \$100.

Course—Leave corner of Central avenue and Main street, through Central Point by postoffice, over Hanley Hill, around Bybee corner, returning on main road to Medford, finishing at Medford National bank. Roads cleared and all precautions taken to avoid accident.

WANT BAND MUSIC? HERE'S YOUR CHANCE

It is now up to the residents of the city of Medford to say whether they wish band concerts in the park this summer or not. The band boys have hit upon a scheme whereby the people who enjoy the concerts can pay for them and at a very slight cost to each. Postal cards are soon to be sent out, upon which will appear the following:

"Medford, Ore., June 20, '09.—I, the undersigned, hereby agree to pay for the support of the Medford Concert band the sum of 10 cents each week for a period of one year from above date, in consideration of which said band agrees to give 10 free concerts in the Medford city park. Signed....."

LUMBER COMBINE BACK OF TROUBLE AT M'CLOUD
