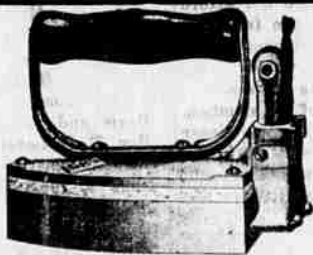

THE FAIR AN ARTISTIC PRODUCT.

IDAHO MAN FIRST THROUGH FAIR GATE

Real Estate Dealer of Nampa on Deck Before Turnstiles Swing to Admit 90,000 People.

SEATTLE, June 10.—An Idaho man, thoroughly imbued with the progressive spirit of his home state, was the first man through the big gates of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition when the fair opened on June 1.

This man from Idaho, J. Fremont Bow by name, must have boarded an early car for he was standing up dangerously near one of the coin machines about twenty minutes past eight o'clock on the opening morning.

C. R. Collins, treasurer of the exposition, happened by just at that minute and decided to open the big show. Approaching Bow, he said: "Young man, you will be the first person through the gates of the A-Y-P. Drop in your money."

At first Bow did not exactly comprehend the situation. He sort of let the half dollar slip from his fingers and was shoved through the turnstile soon to be followed by more than 90,000 persons, the attendance that marked the opening day of the fair.

Later Bow sent his card to Treasurer Collins. He is a real estate dealer in Nampa, Idaho.

HENEY TO RUN FOR DISTRICT ATTORNEY

Prosecutor Will Be Candidate if Right Man Is Not Named. Run as Republican.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 10.—Francis J. Heney will be a candidate for district attorney, according to the Call. He will enter the fight, the Call says, as a Republican. He does not wish to become a candidate, but he will rather than have the work of the past three years nullified by the election of a man opposed to the graft prosecution. He said yesterday:

"Yes, I will be a candidate for district attorney if the right man is not brought out with something like more than reasonable assurance of his election. I will not see the work of the last three years thrown away. And I will not stand idly by and see the thieves and crooks capture the district attorney's office."

"I do not want to be a candidate and I do not want to be district attorney. I think it is unfair that I should be forced to make the fight, but I will make it rather than see the office go by default to the crooks, as it now appears to be going."

"I do not purpose to permit the people to think that I want to shirk any duty I owe them, and I certainly do not purpose to permit the crooks and grafters to think that they are to be permitted to nullify the work of three years. There is no question in my mind about how the people stand on this question. In any event the question will be put up to them, in the person of another candidate, I hope, but it will be put up to them."

MARSHFIELD, Ore., June 10.—The friendly suit brought to test the validity of the port law will be taken up by Judge John S. Coke in circuit court at Coquille next Monday, and will be appealed as soon as possible to the supreme court. The members of the port commission wanted the suit so that they would have a court decision and no question could later come as to the lawfulness of their acts.
